Lancaster ISD Students Take An Inside Look at Southwest Airlines

LANCASTER-Lancaster ISD students in the BI60 STEM Camp visited the Southwest Airlines HDQ and Southwest Airlines Dispatch Center in Dallas, TX for a tour.

The tour served as a real-time connection to the concepts they are currently learning in the classrooms this summer.

Lancaster ISD K-12 STEM Science Instructional Coach, Kenya Wilson explained how the visit connected to what students had been studying.

"The discussions with the airplane dispatcher centered on the importance of communication and problem-solving, which students immediately related to the PBLS they experienced in their classrooms," she said.

The students marveled at the décor that started from the lobby and flowed throughout the entire building. The entrance featured miniature airplanes in different colors and sizes hanging from the ceiling, posters and drawings.

While on the tour, they viewed numerous rooms and offices and, according to the students, not one room was like the other. Each room has its own theme or name with different furniture and colors. Students also entered the viewing room where, through a window, they saw the airlines network operations command, or NOC, room. Here, they witnessed dispatchers, crew schedulers, and customer service coordinators hard at work.

Wilson also shared that, "the benefit of the Southwest HDQ tour was that it demystified the airline industry. Their unique people-first culture enabled our students to see the humanitarian aspect of engineering and mechanics."

This summer, the BI60 STEM Camp attendees have also visited the Frontiers of Flight Museum and drove go-carts where they used the facility's garage to compare the go-carts to the structural components of the racecar they are currently building.

The summer camp, which is a partnership with Captain Barrington Irving and Experience Aviation, is in its third and final session and will conclude with the students unveiling the full-size racecar that they have been building all summer.

DCCCD Students' Experiment, Dreams Crystallize In Space



DALLAS- Like ideas, crystals form, take shape and grow. They become snowflakes, diamonds or salt. They also could assume new characteristics when chemicals in those crystals might become altered in the zero gravity of space.

Countless elementary school children have grown sugar crystals on a string in science class - rock candy. But only a select group of students from Eastfield and El Centro colleges in the Dallas County Community College District's system have tried to crystallize sodium acetate under zero-gravity and near-zero-gravity conditions.

Six of those eight students - the 2014 DCCCD NASA team - spent a week on the ground and flew parabolas in the sky (on NASA's famous "Weightless Wonder" jumbo jet) to test their experiments. They wanted to learn how a sodium acetate crystal might look when grown in zero gravity in super-saturated sodium, compared to the effects of regular gravity on earth.

DCCCD's team was one of only three community colleges in the country chosen to participate in a 2014 Reduced Gravity Education Flight as part of NASA's Minority University Research and Education Program. A total of 13 colleges and universities from across the country were selected to test their experiments in flight. NASA's space- and researched-based programs and testing include educational outreach that is designed to promote careers in STEM fields: science, technology, engineering and mathematics. NASA is particularly interested in minority students who are enrolled in colleges and universities because they typically are underrepresented in STEM fields.

During the team's stay in Houston, the DCCCD students prepared their experiment and adapted the method they were using to conduct their research in double containment. They placed their experiment inside a box created by NASA, which created a double containment that preserved the experiment in the extreme environment of the parabolic jet flight. The box created its own challenge for the team because they had to be able to work with the seed crystal in their sealed solution without opening the jar (they ended up using a magnet). Members also spent a day with NASA scientists, who visited with them and reviewed every team's experiment - making suggestions and sharing observations along the way. And then the DCCCD team flew on the jumbo jet - a small group of students among a handful of people in the world who have experienced the thrill of zero gravity. Now they are assessing and analyzing their results.

Free Back-to-School Immunizations, August 16

Dallas County Health and Human Services (DCHHS) will open its immunization clinic Saturday, August 16 from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. to provide free vaccinations for families eligible for Texas Vaccines for Children (TVFC). Children's Medical Center staff will also be on site to answer questions and provide application assistance to parents whose children may be eligible for free or low-cost health coverage through Medicaid or Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). The clinic is located on the

first floor of the DCHHS building at 2377 N. Stemmons Fwy. in Dallas. Parents must bring their child's vaccination records. Appointments aren't necessary.

Dallas County residents from birth to age 18 in the following categories are eligible to receive free immunizations August 16 under the TVFC program:

- Medicaid eligible
- Uninsured: a child who has no health insurance coverage
- American Indian or Alaskan Native

• Enrolled in CHIP

• Underinsured (as defined by the Texas Department of State Health Services): a child who has commercial (private) health insurance, but coverage does not include vaccines; a child whose insurance covers only selected vaccines (TVFC-eligible for non-covered vaccines only); or a child whose insurance caps vaccine coverage at a certain amount. Once that coverage amount is reached, the child is categorized as underinsured. Insured children with vaccine cover-

age who have high copays or deductibles are no longer considered underinsured. These children are now considered fully privately insured and are no longer eligible for TVFC vaccines.

To find out whether a child is eligible for TVFC, check with the insurance provider to determine whether immunizations are covered.

Families wishing to apply for Medicaid or CHIP should bring the following:

- Child's Social Security Number

• A copy (front and back) of your child's Alien Registration Card (I-551) if your child is not a U.S. citizen

- A copy of your child's birth certificate

• Proof of each family member's income, such as most recent paycheck stub, letter from an employer stating how much is earned or papers that show how much is being received in child support

- Proof of how much your family pays for childcare, disabled adult care or child support

"This is a great opportunity for children to receive their back-to-school immunizations and for those families who need assistance to apply for Medicaid and CHIP benefits," said Zachary Thompson, DCHHS director. "Medical care provides essential needs for healthy lives, so we appreciate Children's Medical Center being available to assist families with their applications."

Back to Marcus Garvey. His birthday is this week. The Pan African Connection Bookstore, 828 Fourth Avenue, Dallas, is having the 26th Annual Marcus Mosiah Garvey Tribute Saturday, August 16, 7:00 PM.

The life and times of Marcus Garvey has always been a truly marvelous one. And the irony remains how time moves on and stand still at the same time.

To be clear, this series is about our history and how it relates to and has always related to present times.

I am a John Wiley Price (JWP) Fan and I am not confused about life and reality. Life and the constitution says one thing, but the amplified

version of reality is a nation divided with institutional racism.

Sidebar: I had five (5)grandsons, we lost one this summer in a 'hit and run' tragedy. This g-son met JWP at the antique shop where he was working. The two became acquaintances I am sure because he probably followed him around. JWP took time with him and returned to give him a hat. Well, as you well imagine, this hat became a shrine with its own victory dance and "fish story". He was so proud of it. When the boys were all together, he would remind them that he knew JWP. End of sidebar.

But it is important to me that we truly understand our history. Sure we cite it and listen to fancy speeches lined with eloquent words. Marcus Garvey travelled throughout the United States speaking and meeting with African American leaders. In the post World War I economic crisis and with racial discrimination, lynching and poor housing, the masses of black people were ready for a leader who was intellectually aggressive and had a plan to uplift the race. Everybody say

"uplift the race". By 1919. Again, by 1919, there were over 30 branches throughout the United States, the Caribbean, Latin America and Africa of the Universal Negro Improvement Association. The organization began to fail after he was convicted and was deported from the United States.

The era for African Americans post World War I is amazing. Carter G. Woodson establishes the Journal of Negro History with himself as editor. In Alabama, the revival of the KKK with a membership reaching four million in the 1920's. Ten thousand Negroes marched down Fifth Avenue (New York) in protest against lynchings in the South. Included in the march was James Weldon Johnson and W.E.B. DuBois. In 1919 also, W. E. B. DeBois organized the first Pan-African Congress at the Grand Hotel in Paris.

I read some years ago, that history was like looking in the mirror. What do you see?

Dear Editor,

Warmer temperatures are a welcome change after a long, cold winter—but as the mercury rises, it's crucial to protect our animal companions by never leaving them in parked vehicles.

"The purpose of the law is simple...those who are equal before God shall now also be equal in the polling booths, in the classrooms, in the factories, and in hotels, restaurants, movie theaters, and other places that provide service to the public."

-President Lyndon B. Johnson, July 2, 1964

July 2 marked the 50th anniversary of President Lyndon B. Johnson's signing of the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964 that outlawed discrimination and segregation based on race, color, religion, sex or national origin. First introduced by President John F. Kennedy shortly before his 1963 assassination, the Civil Rights Act also offered greater protections for the right to vote and paved the way for another historic achievement one year later - the Voting

Right Act of 1965.

Momentum for the legislation picked up following the 1963 March on Washington where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the National Urban League's Whitney M. Young, along with 250,000 activists and citizens, gathered to demand "Jobs and Freedom" for people of all races who were locked out, left out, and disenfranchised. President Kennedy, a Massachusetts liberal, introduced the bill in June of 1963, just five months before his assassination.

It was up to his successor, Vice President Lyndon Johnson, a former United States Senator from Texas with deep southern roots, to carry it over the finish line. Despite extreme opposition, especially from his former southern Congressional allies, President Johnson successfully navigated the bill's passage. He signed it into law on July 2, 1964, surrounded by Dr. King, Whitney Young and a multi-racial group of civil rights activists.

It was only 50 years ago that it was legal in some states to deny Blacks the right to eat in the same restaurants as Whites, to sit in the same

day, even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a parked car can reach more than 160 degrees. Parking in the shade and/or leaving water in the vehicle won't help. Symptoms of heatstroke include restlessness, excessive thirst, heavy panting, lethargy, lack of appetite and coordination, dark tongue, and vomiting. Dogs can succumb to heatstroke in just 15 minutes, resulting in brain damage or death.

Please, when it's even a little warm

outside, never leave any living being in a parked car, even for "just a minute." If you see a dog left in a car, have the owner page or call 911 immediately—the dog's life depends on it. Visit www.PETA.org to learn more.

50 Years After the Civil Rights Act of 1964

years is the 2008 election and the 2012 reelection of Barack Obama as America's first Black president. But even that achievement has been met with a backlash, as right wing voter suppression efforts have risen since President Obama first took office and the United States Supreme Court essentially gutted the Voting Rights Act of 1965 last year. Obviously, 50 years after the passage of the Civil Rights Act, our work is not yet done.

As we noted last week in our statement in support of the Voting Rights Amendment Act now before Congress, "The National Urban League believes there is no better and fitting tribute to the men and women who 50 years ago fought for and died to secure a Civil Rights Act and a Voting Rights Act than to pass the VRAA this year before the November mid-term elections. We cannot focus only on a celebration of progress. We must also ensure there is a continuation of the very equality and opportunity that are at the core of this country's democratic values."

Perhaps the most visible demonstration of the progress we have made over the past 50

partner for the long term."

The problem is that Africa already has a long-term partner - China.

While the US-Africa Summit was the first such gathering of African leaders on U.S. soil, China held its fifth Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) in Beijing in 2012. At that conference of African leaders, China pledged to provide \$20 billion a year over three years in foreign aid to deepen the Sino-African connection.

China is not a newcomer to Africa.

As I wrote last year in a series on China, the first trade exchanges between China and Africa are believed to have taken place during the Tang Dynasty [618-907]. China supported many African liberation movements in the 1960s and 1970s.

It was sympathetic to and hosted such prominent African Americans as W.E.B. DuBois, Paul Robeson, Langston Hughes, Malcolm X and Black nationalists Robert F. Williams, Huey P. Newton, Eldridge Cleaver, Angela Davis, and H. Rap Brown.

A report by the Rand Corporation titled, "China in Africa: Implications of a Deepening Relationship," observed: "Most analyses of Chinese engagement with African nations focus on what China gets out of these partnerships - primarily natural resources and export markets. Some studies have described the impacts, positive and negative, that China's aid and investment policies have had on African countries. However, few analyses have approached Sino-African relations as a

vibrant, two-way dynamic in which both sides adjust to political initiatives and popular perceptions emanating from the other."

It explained, "African governments look to China to provide political recognition and legitimacy and to contribute to their economic development through aid, investment, infrastructure development, and trade. To some degree, many African leaders hope that China will interact with them in ways that the United States and other Western governments do not - by engaging economically without condescendingly preaching about good governance, for example, or by investing in high-risk projects or in remote regions that are not appealing to Western governments or companies. Some Africans aspire to replicate China's rapid economic development and believe that their nations can benefit from China's recent experience in lifting itself out of poverty."

U.S. condescension was center-stage throughout the US-Africa Summit.

Vice President Joe Biden, for example, called corruption "a cancer" and added, "Widespread corruption is an affront to the dignity of your people and a direct threat to each of your nations. It stifles economic growth and scares away investment and siphons off resources that should be used to lift people out of poverty."

It didn't help that Biden made another of his famous gaffes, referring to "the nation of Africa."

Not everyone is pleased with the way China conducts business in Africa, comparing it

to a neo-colonial relationship in which China has access to oil, gas and other natural resources in Africa. At the same time, China gains a large market for its goods and services.

To catch up with China, with investments twice as much as the U.S. in Africa, the Obama administration must pivot from its traditional role of providing foreign aid to Africa - with strings attached - to one of an investor/partner.

Many feel increased attention from the U.S. will be good for Africa.

"While the United States and China may not be strategic rivals in Africa, the two countries could increasingly compete commercially if American businesses become more engaged in African markets...." the Rand report stated. "...Such business competition would benefit African countries and advance U.S. interests. African governments might be able to negotiate more favorable commercial terms if they are not beholden to Chinese financing. African communities would benefit, as American companies are more likely than their Chinese counterparts to hire local laborers for skilled and unskilled positions, transfer industrial technologies to local partners, require humane working conditions, and contribute to initiatives that promote the health and welfare of their workforce. Such business practices would likely encourage Chinese enterprises to do the same so as to secure deals, compete in local labor and consumer markets, and enhance China's image in Africa."

"The Cry Of A Troubled Ssaint" Psalm 77:1-20

perplexing. With that thought in mind, I was lead to read certain verses in the book of Job that spoke about the troubles of mankind. Every man dwelling upon this earth is faced with trouble, for Job 14:1 says, "Man that is born of a woman is of a few days, and full of trouble." Again, Job affirms the trouble of man, in that, Job 5:7 states, "Yet man is born unto trouble, as the sparks fly upward."

In verses 1-3, Asaph revealed his problem in his prevailing prayer of asking God to hear him. He had agonized in prayer but it was a failure. In verse 3 he says, "I remembered God, and was troubled: I complained, and my spirit was overwhelmed." As he searched

for an answer, he thought of his former days when God did deliver. However, he remained confused and he found no reason for praise (vv. 4-6). Continuing to be in distress, Asaph thought that God had abandoned him and the nation (vv. 7-9). Because he saw no immediate response he was led to question, "Will the Lord cast off for ever? and will He be favourable no more? (v. 7)."

As believers today, when undergoing trouble, let us remember that God is always with us as we struggle with the issues of life (Hebrews 13:5-6). Although this psalmist was in deep trouble, he really received comfort by meditating on God's awesome deliverance of Israel during the Exodus (vv.

10-20). He resolves in verses 10-11 to remain confident as he states, "And I said, This is my infirmity: but I will remember the years of the right hand of the most High. I will remember the works of the LORD: surely I will remember thy wonders of old."

God's great power revealed in the past should promote meditative praise for God's people who need a way of rescue for their troubles! If God can rescue those in the past, He can rescue those who are in trouble, right now! When trouble arises in our lives, let us trust in the Lord for He knows how to minister in a time of crisis!

Are You Raising One of the Next Generation of Hoodlums: Expectations for a NEW SCHOOL YEAR

Parents: Research has shown that parental expectations for children's academic achievement predict educational outcomes more than any other measures of parental involvement. So please know that the expectations parents have for their sons' behavior also matter! The expectations parents have for their sons' school attainment influence their sons' expectations and achievement. So please, make it clear to your son that you expect him to achieve and you expect him to behave appropriately.

Parental expectations are more likely to affect children when parent-child relationships are characterized by closeness and warmth. Parental expectations influence children's outcomes through numerous pathways. Parental expectations directly affect the amount of parent-child communication about school. Additionally, families with high educational aspirations for their sons take the

time to provide out-of-school learning opportunities for them. Students who say their parents expect them to attend college have better attendance and more positive attitudes toward school, according to one study.

Parental expectations also affect your sons' own aspirations and personal expectations. Studies suggest that parents' expectations for their children's academic attainment have a moderate to strong influence on students' own goals for postsecondary education. Further, both sets of expectations are moderated by characteristics of the parent, child, and community.

Begin early in your sons' lives making them aware that you have expectations for them and assuring that they know what your expectations are. One of the main reasons many boys get off track in school is because their parents do not talk with them on a regular basis regarding what they expect. Many parents wait until their sons get in trouble, either behaviorally or academically, before they have a serious conversation with them about appropriate behavior and the importance of putting forth their best efforts. They are seemingly reluctant to talk to their sons about what they, as parents, expect them to do and what they expect them not to do. Both are important!

Summer is just about over. The new academic year is imminent. No matter what grade level your young son,

tween or teen is entering this new school year, provide him the opportunity to enter with your clear, parental expectations firmly fixed in his psyche. This is one of the best things you can do for your son!

Make sure you are clear and specific and that your son understands that certain expectations are not negotiable, that you expect this to always happen. Specific, non-negotiable items should include:

- Respectful speech and attitude (most especially with adult authorities)

- All written communication sent by the school will be given to you promptly

- All homework and in-school assignments will be completed

- There will be no bullying (ever)

- You will choose appropriate friends and associates

Parents: It is very important for your sons to know that you have expectations for them and also equally important that they know what your expectations are. Clarifying your expectations prior to the beginning of the new school year, and then providing frequent reminders to keep the expectations fresh on your sons' minds serves to help them maintain their focus.
