U.S. Navy Names First 4-Star Female Admiral

(AP) - Vice Admiral Michelle Howard has been tapped by President Barack Obama to become the Navy's vice chief of naval operations. If confirmed, she would be the first woman and first African-American to hold the number two spot in the naval warfare service branch of the U.S. Navy, according to Time.

Serving currently as deputy chief of naval operations for operations, plans, and strategy, the 53-year-old's promotion follows a trend from the Obama administration of placing more women in higher defense positions. Ann Elizabeth Dunwoody became a four-star officer in the U.S. Army in 1998. In March of last year, Janet Wolfenbarger became the first female four-star general in Air Force history.

Howard, a surface warfare officer, graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1982. She received her Masters in Military Arts and Sciences from the Army's Command and General Staff College in 1998. The Aurora, Colo., native has quite a few "firsts" under her belt. She is the first African-American woman to command a U.S. Navy warship, the first female graduate of the Naval Academy to achieve the rank of rear-admiral and the first African-American woman to command an expeditionary strike group at sea.

STUDENT LOAN BILL OF RIGHTS BY CHARLENE CROWELL

In the aftermath of a recent report that found the lack of student loan servicing standards and information on monies owed, two U.S. Senators will work as a team to create a Student Loan Borrower Bill of Rights.

Sponsored by Illinois Senator Richard Durbin and co-sponsored by Senator Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts, the measure is intended to ensure that all student loan borrowers fully understand the range of repayment options and resources available to them. For service members and veterans, the measure would require loan servicers to provide each borrower

with a liaison specifically trained in the benefits available to military borrowers. Thirdly, the bill calls for fair treatment of borrowers by the financial institutions servicing their loans.

"With student loan debt far outpacing the rise in starting salaries, many of these borrowers find they are unable to make their monthly payments," said Durbin. "When lenders refuse to work with them on a repayment plan, they begin a downward spiral that is difficult to turn around. That debt keeps them from being able to purchase homes, cars or other goods which fuel our economy . . . Every borrower should have basic protections when it comes to their student loans."

The bill proposes six basic rights for borrowers of both federal and private student loans. Those rights are:

Options such as alternative payment plans to avoid default; Information about key terms and conditions of the loan and any repayment options to ensure changing plans will not cost more;

Knowledge of who the loan servicer is and how to reach them;

Consistent practices on how monthly payments are applied, with a specific requirement for lenders and servicers to honor promotions and promises that are

were either advertised or offered; Fairness, such as grace periods when loans are transferred, or debt cancellation when the borrower dies or becomes disabled; and

Accountability accompanied by timely resolution of any errors and/or certification of private loans.

Last October, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) released a report revealing that a growing number of private student loan borrowers are burdened with debt that has no limits on interest rates and few, if any, options for alternative repayment plans.

CFPB's analysis of 3,800 student loan complaints received from October 1, 2012 through September 30, 2013 found that 87 percent were directed at one of eight companies. Sallie Mae, a financial services firm specializing in educational loans for more than 40 years, topped the complaint list with nearly half – 49 percent. In other cases, according to CFPB, federal student loan borrowers were unaware of their available repayment options such as income-based repayment.

Both types of borrowers experienced problems with payment misallocation. This specific problem was a challenge to resolving account errors in a timely manner.

In a more recent and related report, the Institute for College Access and Success' (TICAS) Project on Student Debt found that seven in 10 of 2012 college graduates had student loan debt. Additionally, the Class of 2012 had an average debt of \$29,400.

Each year from 2008 to 2012, this report found that the average debt of federal and private loans combined increased 6 percent each year. These figures were drawn from data voluntarily provided by 1,075 public four-year and four-year private nonprofit institutions.

Although TICAS contacted for-profit colleges which accounted for seven percent of 2012 bachelor's recipients, none chose to share their data. The lack of this additional data may have contributed to understating the scope and volume of the nation's student loan debt, now estimated to be \$1.1 trillion.

"Borrowers are already struggling to make ends meet as they graduate with debt that surpasses their annual wages," noted Sen. Durbin. "These borrowers and their families should not have to face additional costs because they cannot resolve errors quickly or gain access to programs meant to help them. My bill will ensure that all borrowers will have access to these basic rights and protections."

The Obama –Castro Handshake

In the tradition of the Black Church in America, the right hand of fellowship handshake is extended as sign of welcome into the church community. Usually, a handshake between two world leaders at a memorial service is not seen as something controversial or unprecedented. On December 10, however, at the beginning of the memorial service for Nelson "Madiba" Mandela in the heart of Soweto, South Africa, the handshake between President Barack Obama and President Raul Castro Ruiz of Cuba was viewed differently. It was not so much as an affront to any religious protocol, but was viewed by many as being controversial and consequential depending on political, ideological, cultural and historical perceptions or perspectives.

I have always maintained that if not reported anywhere else, it is important for the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), Black Press USA, to share with its millions of readers an analysis that goes beyond the hype of the mainstream media in America on issues that are vital to the strategic economic, political

and cultural interests of the African American community as well as the interests of freedom-loving people throughout the world. It is, therefore, important to look deeper into the significance of the Obama-Castro handshake for both historical and contemporary clarity.

The first issue should be the respectful acknowledgement of the tide-turning role that Cuba played in the global anti-apartheid struggle. In the 1980's the frontline African nations that bordered South Africa were periodically being militarily violated with the brutal violence and repression that became routine of the apartheid regime. South African military attacks directly on the African National Congress (ANC) inside South Africa and in Angola, South West Africa and in other areas of southern Africa had escalated.

In fact, South Africa invaded South West Africa (now Namibia) and the Republic of Angola. President Fidel Castro Ruiz urgently dispatched more than three hundred thousand Cuban soldiers to Angola over several years to help stop and to eventually defeat the South Africa military on the ground in Angola in 1988. By contrast, keep in mind that President Ronald Reagan from 1981 to 1989 tacitly supported apartheid South Africa and tried unsuccessfully to have a "constructive engagement" with apartheid under the guise of preventing communism in southern Africa.

I traveled to Angola in 1988 on

more than one occasion to witness firsthand how Cuba was helping the MPLA (Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola) in Angola and the ANC as well as SWAPO (South West Africa Peoples Organization). I visited the battleground area in the aftermath of the Battle of Cuito Cuanavale that took place during a six month period from the end of 1987 to the spring of 1988. That battle was the largest single armed conventional warfare on African soil since World War II. I went down into the foxholes with Cubans, Angolans, Namibians and native South Africans, all fighting together heroically to liberate southern Africa from oppression, colonialism and imperialism. One of the key commanders of all the Cuban troops in southern Africa was Raul Castro Ruiz, then-President Fidel Castro's younger brother.

Thus, for millions of Africans all over South Africa, Angola, Namibia and across the continent of Africa and throughout the African Diaspora, including America, the sight of President Barack Obama shaking the hand of President Raul Castro Ruiz was filled with a sense of historical gratitude to thank Cuba for helping Africa and to note how far the struggle for African liberation, self-determination and empowerment has advanced during the past 60 years.

But this does not mean that the struggle for freedom and economic prosperity is over in Africa. The memorial service for Madiba and

the state funeral later are very important milestones that we all should mark with a sense of rededication to continue the struggle for African liberation and progress as a lasting tribute to the legacy of Nelson Mandela.

Hopefully, the Obama-Castro handshake will also prompt the Obama administration to take more steps to improve relations between the United States and Cuba. We are aware that there are currently efforts to support more cultural exchanges between the U.S. and Cuba today as well as to increase economic development interests in anticipation of the eventual lifting of the sanctions against Cuba.

South Africa President Jacob Zuma had a private meeting with President Raul Castro after the Obama-Castro handshake. President Zuma affirmed, "It is very important to us that President Castro came in person. Paying tribute to Madiba would not have been complete without the participation of Cuba."

Likewise it was important for President Obama to be characteristically bold and respectful by reaching his hand to grasp the hand of President Castro. It was the right gesture to do for the sake of history. Lastly, out of respect to Nelson Mandela's legacy, we all should take further actions that will exhibit the hope that a better day is coming for the people of the U.S., Cuba, Africa and the world community.

"A PSALMIST'S CRY OF DELIVERANCE" PSALM 55:1-23

The superscription of this psalm reads, "To the chief Musician on Neginoth, Maschil, A Psalm of David, when the Ziphims came and said to Saul, Doth not David hide himself with us?" This psalm, written by David, reveals that David is in deep distress because the

Ziphims had betrayed him. The background for this psalm is found in 1 Samuel 23. The life of David was filled with moments of betrayal: he was betrayed by Doeg in Psalm 52 (1 Samuel 21-22); he was betrayed by Achithophel in Psalm 55; and now he is being betrayed by the Ziphites (1 Samuel 23:19).

In the midst of being betrayed, David cries out vehemently to the Lord in verses 1-2 as he says, "Save me O God, by thy name, and judge me by thy strength, Hear my prayer, O God; give ear to the words of my mouth." David cries out to the Lord, because the Ziphites had told Saul where David was hiding. They had truly betrayed David. Can't you feel the urgency of David's appeal to God, having been betrayed? David petitions the Lord to deliver him based on the name of God - His nature,

character. In the midst of his distress, David calls upon the name of God, the only One who is able to help him in his distress. David cites the reason for petitioning the Lord, for verse 3 says, "For strangers are risen up against me, and oppressors seek after my soul: they have not set God before them."

These vile and vicious men's aim was to destroy David; in addition, they had no regard for God. Although David felt the sting of being betrayed, in verses 4-7 he recognizes that the Lord will be his support. U.S. NAVY NAMES FIRST 4-STAR FEMALE ADMIRAL

Howard, who is married to retired Marine Wayne Cowles, came from a military family; her dad was an Air Force master sergeant. At age 12, Howard knew she wanted to follow in her dad's footsteps, but a federal law blocked women from military academies at the time. Her mom tried to encourage her daughter not to give up and keep hope alive that one day she would be able to attend a naval academy. In 1978, Howard's dream finally came true and, at age 17, she was in the third class of women admitted to the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md.

By the time 1999 rolled

around, Howard became the first African-American woman to command a Navy warship at sea, the amphibious dock landing ship USS Rushmore. Howard taking command of the ship actually raised eyebrows not because of her sex but her race. Howard told Time, "For some of the sailors, it was a big deal-not because of the woman thing, but because of the African-American thing. I literally had people coming up, wanting to have their picture taken with me-this is the first time this has happened, where a minority woman has had command of a ship."

There was some hostility coming from haters in the Navy during Howard's early days

when she was still green behind the ears. Assignments that she was very qualified to handle were instead handed out to men who were less capable. Soon, however, the tables turned for Howard. "What's great about the Navy is that, despite the few knuckleheads that exist, there are a lot of folks who are professional and who will grade you on your performance and not on how you look."

Howard, if confirmed, will replace current Vice Chief of Naval Operations (VCNO), Adm. Mark E. Ferguson, for the position serving directly under CNO Adm. Jonathan Greenert.



TEXAS COACH MACK BROWN STEPS DOWN



(AP) - Mack Brown united and revived a divided and dormant Texas football program and coached the Longhorns to their first undisputed national title in 36 years.

Now after four sea-

sons with at least four losses, Brown is stepping down to make way for the next coach to try to push the Longhorns back into the nation's elite.

Texas announced Saturday night that Brown, who won the 2005 national championship, is retiring after 16 seasons, with his final game to be the Dec. 30 Alamo Bowl against Oregon.

In a statement released by the school Saturday night, Brown acknowledged it was time for a change after a 30-20 record and 18-17 mark in the Big 12 over the last

four seasons. Texas is 8-4 this season and lost the Big 12 title to Baylor in the final game of the regular season.

Brown led the Longhorns through a run of dominance from 2001-2009 when the Texas went 101-16, won two Big 12 titles and twice played for the national championship.

He has 158 victories at Texas, No. 2 behind the late Darrell Royal, who won 167 in 20 seasons with the Longhorns. Brown is 244-121-1 overall in 29 years as a head coach.




