A nighttime session of the House Oversight Committee intended to discuss a resolution recommending Attorney General Merrick Garland be held in contempt of Congress descended into chaos amid personal attacks and partisan bickering.

There are sincerely no words to say to Dr. Harry Robinson for his supreme dedication, his meta dream for America, and the special gift designed exclusively for the people of Dallas.

On December 14, 2024, we celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the African American Museum and the Retirement of Dr. Harry Robinson. Few people missed the appropriately styled Founder's Ball 50th. In attendance were 850+glamourous citizens gathered in the Grand Ballroom of the Hilton Anatole Hotel for a glimpse of the

'superhero.' A sellout... knockout best-dressed list of who's who. Posted on my social media pages were pictures of 'what I am wearing to the Founder's Ball'.

I vividly remember the earlier days in the Basement of Bishop College (nee Paul Quinn College). Dr. Robinson joined Bishop College's Staff as a librarian and museum director in 1974. The ultimate champion of history in Dallas at that time was one force, Mable Chandler, a renowned history teacher counselor at Lincoln High School. Mable Chandler was also my Sunday School Superintendent. I saw her every Sunday morning as a young church musician, and I might add that she was on time. Chandler was well connected, belonged to several educational organizations surrounding the richness of black history and culture,

and was a walking ency-

clopedia of the Bible and

Dallas History. Dr. Robinson attended graduate school at Atlanta University and majored in Library Science. He was primarily a researcher. When I look back on his career, factoring in a degree in 1965 from Atlanta University and a return to Southern University to continue work as an Archivist, a cataloger at Kentucky State University and a short stay at the University of Florida, it is easy to see where all of these boxes came from. As the news got around, more boxes arrived to catalog and find a home

With Mable Chandler and Julia Jordan to guide him...(ooh, let me stop calling names; that is not a good idea), several black librarians, all legends in their fields, came together and formed "this ad-hoc circle" around Dr. Harry Robinson. These were educators from across the spectrum of several churches near

and far. What is most etched in my mind is that this group of 'helpers' for Dr. Robinson brought in a second layer of "junior helpers" to sort through the mounds of papers/boxes assembled by Dr. Robinson from his many collections for the museum. I was in that category. During these appointed times, there was little conversation and lots of organization in the "midst of a promise-to-be."

Tremendous thanks to those who stayed the course. I have to mention the unstoppable Helen Giddings. (Stop calling names JED). OK! To the teams of professional organizers, splendid sponsors, media professionals, mighty, mighty influencers.

Now, where are the new visionaries? Who are the new innovators? Where are the dedicated 'helpers'?

The Great Sacrificial Work of Christ

Hebrews 2:14-18

In our great study of the book of Hebrews thus far, we have seen that Jesus Christ is superior to the Prophets in Hebrews 1:1-3 because the Prophets' ministry was partial and fragmentary, however, Christ is superior to the Prophets because He is God's final revelation. Now, the author will prove unmistakably that Jesus is superior to the Angels in Hebrews 1:4-2:18. He has proven that Angels were created and were servants who worshipped Christ, whereas Christ is the Creator, and the Son of God who will rule in the Millennium Kingdom.

Beginning in Hebrews 2:14-15, the author will discuss the fact that as the Son of Man, Christ accomplished a great sacrificial work for man. First of all, as Son of

Man, Christ delivered mankind from the fear of death (Hebrews 2:14-15). In accomplishing this work of redemption for us, it was essential that God would become man in the person of Jesus Christ in order to taste death for us (Hebrews 2:9). The only reason Jesus Christ was even for a little time lower than the Angels, was so He could pursue His loving mission in dying for sinful mankind. magnitude Christ's sacrifice for us is priceless and beyond our mental comprehension. He died "for all humanity," meaning that He took upon Himself the penalty due to fallen humanity, for II Corinthians 5:21 states: "For He hath made Him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

By identifying with mankind in becoming human, and dying for mankind, Christ broke the power of sin and death. Because Christ paid the ultimate penalty for our sins when He died and rose again from the dead, we should not allow our lives to be controlled and governed by the fear of death. In His victory over sin, death, and the grave, not only did Christ deliver us from the fear of death, but He also deprived Satan of the power he had over us. We have been delivered from Satan's enslavement and have been given eternal life in Christ. Speaking of the deliverance that we now have, the Apostle Paul writes: "Who hath delivered us from

the power of darkness and hath translated us into the kingdom of His dear Son. In whom we have redemption through His blood, even the forgiveness of sins" (Colossians 1:13-14).

In verses 16-18, another great accomplishment of Christ's sacrificial work is that now He serves as our High Priest (Hebrews 2:16-18). His great redemptive love toward mankind is revealed in that Christ came through the "seed of Abraham, and not through the nature of Angels" (v. 16). In order to meet the need of mankind, Christ became one of the "seed of Abraham." In Genesis 12:3, God had promised that through Abraham "all families of the earth would be blessed." Christ was the offspring

bring that blessing. Everyone who has faith in Christ, whether Jew or Gentile, is likewise a son of Abraham (Galatians 3:7, 27). In becoming man, being victorious over death, Christ acts as our High Priest. That He would even bother to come to earth as a man shows that He is "merciful" (Hebrews 2:17).

And because of what He

experienced, He could

identify with and under-

stand the struggles that

we face! Yes, Christ knows about our struggles, our pains, sorrows and disappointments. He is not unaware of the temptation that we encounter, for Hebrews 4:15 says: "For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling

of our infirmities but was

in all pointed tempted like as we are, yet without sin." In Christ's Priestly role, presently, He intercedes for us, but He also gave His life in the past for us. He died on Calvary, was buried, but rose triumphantly from the grave. He paid completely for our salvation, as the hymn writer records:

I hear the Savior say, "Thy strength indeed is small; Child of weakness, watch and pray, Find in Me thine all in all."

Jesus paid it all, All to Him I owe; Sin had left a crimson stain, He washed it white as snow.

hurt?" Ocasio-Cortez responded sharply, "Oh, girl? Baby girl, don't even play." Just minutes Greene, of all members, attacked Ocasio-Cortez's intelligence, challenging her to a debate and asserting,

"You don't have enough intelligence." This prompted audible groans from other members. Despite agreeing to strike her comments toward Crockett, Greene refused to apologize for her remarks.

"You will never get an apol-

ogy out of me," she de-

clared. Committee Chair

James Comer (R-Ky.) ruled

that Greene's insult did not violate House rules, which led to further disputes. When Democratic ranking member Jamie Raskin (D-Md.) attempted to appeal this ruling, Republicans moved to table his appeal.

Following the vote, Crockett sought clarification on the committee's standards regarding personal attacks. In a game that pitted one of Texas high school football's most storied programs against a rising force, SOC (14-3) battled

entered the game averaging 37.4 points per contest, were stymied at key moments by a relentless Randefense. Senior quarterback Carter K., who passed for 1,931 yards and 22 touchdowns this season, led a spirited effort, but the Lions' ultimately prevailed.

SOC's playoff run this year was their fourth consecutive trip to the state championship game, a stretch that includes backto-back titles in 2021 and 2022. The team has gone 23-2 in postseason play since 2021, establishing itself as a Dallas ISD powerhouse and a force in Texas high school football.

"It is something to brag on, to be able to say that your class has been to state four years in a row," he said. "We have never not known the championship game."

Despite the loss, the undefeated Lions Golden Bears' season was filled with milestones. Senior running backs Mikail T. The Golden Bears, who and Damond W. combined for 32 rushing touchdowns, while senior linebacker Jayden S. anchored the defense with 118 tackles.

The loss doesn't diminish SOC's historic run over the past four seasons. The 2021 title broke a decadeslong drought for Dallas ISD, and the program's three championship appearances since then have solidified the Golden Bears as a model of success and perseverance.

As the seniors look ahead to their next chapters, the underclassmen and coaching staff remain focused on building upon this year's accomplishments.

"My biggest thing is to show these young men that nothing is impossible," said Jason Tood, head coach. "You can be from South Oak Cliff or similar areas that pull you in different directions, but if you stay locked in and have blind faith at times, you can get to heights you never thought you could achieve."

Safety tips for driving this holiday season:

· Slow down and pay attention to what you're doing. If you get tired, pull over in a safe spot and walk around to re-energize.

• Don't drink and drive, even a little

• Designate a (sober) driver.

• Stay off the mobile phone – this includes texting. Designate a "co-pilot" to oversee the phone while you're driving so you can concentrate on the task at hand.

• Buckle up – all occupants of the vehicle, every trip - no matter how short. Most traffic crashes happen close to home.

• Traveling by motorcycle? Wear a helmet.


• Stay weather-aware. If it's snowy or icy, you'll need to slow down significantly so you don't slide on unexpected icy spots. If it's raining heavily, turn around and don't drown if water is running across the road. Only two feet of rushing water can sweep away a vehicle.



evidence during the punishment phase of the trial that seven other properties – mostly church buildings or lots owned by churches had similar "hallmarks" of deed fraud.

Prosecutors played jurors a May 2021 story detailing the deed-fraud theft of First Christian Church of Lancaster.

The WFAA story revealed records filed in March 2019 with the Dallas County Clerk showed that an individual claiming to be the church chairman deeded the church over to Foster for \$10.

In a telephone interview in the WFAA story, Foster told WFAA that he believed the building was vacant and said he had been cutting the grass.

He told WFAA investigative reporter Tanya Eiserer that he put a \$10 check in the mail and believed he was within his rights to acquire ownership of the property.

Biden Commutes Sentences of 37 Federal Death Row Inmates

The American Civil Liberties Union celebrated President Joe Biden's historic action in commuting 37 federal death sentences. The group proclaimed that Biden has taken an "unequivocal stand against one of the most flawed and inhumane mechanisms of the U.S. criminal legal system."

"President Biden took a historic and courageous step in addressing the failed death penalty in the United States – bringing us much closer to outlawing the barbaric practice once again," said Anthony D. Romero, executive director of the ACLU. "President Biden has reaffirmed the power of redemption over retribution and reminds us that state-sanctioned killing does not make us safer. The ACLU has long advocated against the death penalty and shed light on its fundamental flaws – it is error prone, racially biased, and a

drain on public resources. And al-

though we had hoped President Biden would commute all federal death sentences for those reasons, today's milestone brings us much closer to our goal of outlawing the death penalty once and for all."

By commuting the sentences of 37 individuals on death row, Biden has taken the most consequential step of any president in our history to address the immoral and unconstitutional harms of capital punishment, the ACLU said in a release. "With a stroke of his pen, the President locks in his legacy as a leader who stands for racial justice, humanity, and morality. This will undoubtedly be one of the seminal achievements of the Biden presidency," Romero asserted.

On Monday, December 23, Biden commuted the sentences of 37 individuals on federal death row, changing their punishment from execution to life without the possibility of parole. The White House said the latest decision aligns with the ad-

ministration's ongoing efforts to curtail the federal death penalty, leaving only three individuals still sentenced to death at the federal level.

The commutations exclude cases involving terrorism or hate-motivated mass murder. Among those who remain on death row are Robert Bowers, responsible for killing 11 people at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh in 2018; Dylann Roof, who murdered nine Black worshippers at a Charleston church in 2015; and Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, one of the Boston Marathon bombers in 2013.

"Make no mistake: I condemn these murderers, grieve for the victims of their despicable acts, and ache for all the families who have suffered unimaginable and irreparable loss," Biden said. "But guided by my conscience and my experience... I am more convinced than ever that we must stop the use of the death penalty at the federal level."
