Why Celebrate Juneteenth?

Juneteenth is the oldest known celebration of the ending of slavery. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that all slaves were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863. The Emancipation Proclamation had little impact on the Texans due to the minimal number of Union troops to enforce the new Executive order. However, with the surrender of General Lee in April of 1865, and the arrival of General Granger's regiment, the forces were finally strong enough to influence and overcome the resistance. Today, Juneteenth commemorates African American freedom and emphasizes education and achievement. It is a day, a week, and in some areas a month marked with celebrations, guest speakers, picnics and family gatherings. It is a time for reflection and rejoicing. It is a time for assessment, self-improvement and for planning the future. Its growing popularity signifies a level of maturity and dignity in America long over due. In cities across the country, people of all races, nationalities and religions are joining hands to truthfully acknowledge a period in our history that shaped and continues to influence our society today. Sensitized to the conditions and experiences of others, only then can we make significant and lasting improvements in our society. Throughout the 80's and 90's Juneteenth has continued to enjoy a growing and healthy interest from communities and organizations throughout the country. Institutions such as the Smithsonian, the Henry Ford Museum and others have begun sponsoring Juneteenth-centered activities. In recent years, a number of National Juneteenth Organizations have arisen to take their place along side older organizations - all with the mission to promote and cultivate knowledge and appreciation of African American history and culture. Juneteenth today, celebrates African American freedom while encouraging self-development and respect for all cultures. As it takes on a more national and even global perspective, the events of 1865 in Texas are not forgotten, for all of the roots tie back to this fertile soil from which a national day of pride is growing. The future of Juneteenth looks bright as the number of cities and states come on board and form local committees and organizations to coordinate the activities.

Zero Tolerance Discipline Policies: A Failing Idea

Many school children in America are on summer break right now, but here's a pop quiz about discipline policies in our nation's schools that's just for grownups:

•Would you suspend a student from school for four months for sharpening his pencil without permission and giving the teacher a "threatening" look when asked to sit down?

•Would you expel a student from school for the rest

of a school year for poking another student with a ballpoint pen during an exam?

•Would you expel a student from school permanently because her possession of an antibiotic violated your school's zero-tolerance drug policy?

•Would you call the police, handcuff, and then expel a student who started a snowball fight on school grounds?

If you answered "no" to any of these questions because they sounded too unfair to be the result of an actual policy, give yourself a failing grade. All four are real examples of zero tolerance school discipline policies in Massachusetts—and there are thousands of stories like these throughout that state and across the country. Suspended and expelled students are at greater risk of dropping out of school and dropping into the prison pipeline, and using automat-

ic suspensions and expulsions for minor infractions often has a major negative effect on a child's entire future.

New research analyzing the data from the 2009 - 2010 school year in Massachusetts found nearly 60,000 school expulsions and suspensions. Just more than half of them were for "unassigned offenses" - nonviolent, noncriminal offenses that can include behavioral issues such as swearing, talking back to a teacher, and truancy (I've never understood why you suspend or expel children for not coming to school rather than finding out why). Of the approximately 30,000 "unassigned offenses," two-thirds received out of school suspension, resulting in 57,000 lost days of school. What's more, because Massachusetts schools aren't currently required to report "unassigned offenses"

resulting in exclusions of 10 days or less for regular education students, the estimated actual number of disciplinary exclusions is likely at least two to three times the 60,000 reported.

Jen Vorse Wilka, a student at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government, found these startling statistics when she studied zero tolerance discipline policies in Massachusetts as part of her master's degree program. Her final report, "Dismantling the Cradle to Prison Pipeline: Analyzing Zero Tolerance School Discipline Policies and Identifying Strategic Opportunities for Intervention," received an award from the school's faculty and sheds new light on the need to address these harmful policies.

New Records of Slavery

As slaves, strict records were kept on each ship that came ashore. How is it possible that our ancestors, who could not read and write, have a higher approval rating than the generations that followed? "Up From Slavery", and immediately after slavery we as a people made designing choices that propelled our race. We progressed. We dressed, adopted manners, read by candle light, bought and sold to those who looked like us,

in addition to building more than "400 church house" colleges for our children. In the 60's we sang 'black and proud' louder than James Brown and for a season, black college enrollment was the highest in history.

My grandfather died when I was twelve. He was a carpenter. He built my grandmother's house and the home I was raised in. How was it possible for a black man born in the 1880's to build a house? How much math did he have and who taught him? How in the world did maids, butlers, chauffeurs, gravediggers, send children to college? Reaching the age of realization, Judge Mathis, the television jurist, said at a conference, that his Mother, a single parent, paid more for his education each month than she paid for rent monthly. That was a serious choice toward no slavery here.

As you can imagined I

have had a lot of stimulating conversation this week about "Up From Slavery", last week's article. But these new slavery records . . . are more dangerous. They are self-ordained, self-appointed, and self-inflicted. My disdainment is lodged mainly around television commercials that glamourize, mislead, hammering into minds and imagination what it is you absolutely need to want. Behind all commercials are a set of statistics broken down in categories, minutes, run log and the all important-- who purchased by social class, age, education. A second set of statistics clarify and classify markets. By giving the zip code, dots connect where you live, what time you are up, to what you brought when, where, how. One of the most amazing statistics; nationwide, African Americans spend a billion dollars a month at the casi-

nos. That is a new slavery record that economically drains the entire village. Statistically, we show the rest of the world who we really are by the slave mentality choices we make with our spending power. What we are doing is speaking so loudly . . . that what we are saying is being ignored. And it does not matter if you pay cash, by card, pawn or title loan.

As usual I am out of space and diplomacy. The moral to this article has an awesome conclusion. I advised the mother of a six year old to turn off the 500 channel television set in her son's room for a week. After that week, she came to me with a big grin. "Guess what he did?", she said. "He built himself a cardboard house." Imagine that . . . a mind at work.

We Need a Revolution in Education

Given the current state of our economy, the United States cannot afford to continue the descent in the quality of education its students receive. If we are to secure our future and remain a competitive nation, we must make significant improvements in our educational system. A failure to do so will have drastic consequences for long-range economic prosperity.

The U.S. is ranked ninth globally in the number of young people who are enrolled in colleges and universities. We are fifteenth in the number of university degrees awarded annually.

Our country continues to fail young people from economically challenged families. The numbers of young people from low-income families that attend college are dismal. The system is leaving too many disadvantaged students behind, pushing the American dream beyond their grasp.

There are a number of areas that must be addressed, but I strongly believe that we must initially focus on our youngest students. Once those in elementary and secondary schools are equipped with solid educational foundations, they will excel academically and be prepared to join a sustainable and reliable workforce when they graduate from college, university or trade school.

We must also provide our teachers with adequate resources so that they are able to expose students to new ideas and concepts that otherwise would elude them. We must emphasize to young students that post-secondary education or career technical training is essential to their success, and the continued competitiveness of our country.

Agencies such as NASA and the National Science Foundation should be commended for their efforts to excite and cultivate our next generation of innovators. President Obama has stated that our goal as a nation should be to have the highest percentage of college graduates in the world by 2020. This should be a top priority.

Additionally, we must make education affordable. We should not burden young people with insurmountable debt that deters them from pursuing an education. As a member of Congress, I have fought to protect the Pell Grant Program, and for increased funding to community colleges and Historically Black Colleges and Universities. I strongly support the Department of Education's "Race to the Top" program, which makes grants available to those states that demonstrate a commitment to reform.

As reforms in education evolve, we must pay particular attention to training that is available in the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). A degree in engineering, for instance, can provide a bright future for students who decide to pursue that discipline. Ursula Burns, who heads the Xerox Corporation, has an engineering degree. Successful careers await those who study science, mathematics and technology as well.

No doubt many of our young people will complain that "STEM" study is difficult. Yet, during my years in public life, I have discovered that greatness requires rigorous determination. Our students will discover that the rewards consistent with superior academic preparation are plentiful.

The very backbone of our nation is a learned, visionary and dedicated workforce, possessed with exceptional skills and talents. These are the characteristics of those who made America the most potent industrial and intellectual power in the world.

An educational system that is revolutionary in its thinking, planning and implementation will produce such men and women. That is our need. That is what we must demand!

PLEASANT GROVE BUSINESSMAN WINS SEAT ON THE DALLAS CITY COUNCIL

For the first time since 1989, the southeast Dallas community in Pleasant Grove will have a seat at the horseshoe at Dallas City Hall. Rick Callahan, an old guard Anglo Democrat and Southeast Chamber Executive defeated Latino activist and Southeast Hispanic Chamber exec Jesse Diaz in a bitterly fought and racially divisive campaign. Both businessmen are realtors in Pleasant Grove with little differences between the candidates on the issues but an ocean of differences between the African Americans who wanted "race left of the race."

A Dallas Morning News editorial accurately described District 5 as "home to a once-dominant white community that is now a minority there; a black community that strongly identifies with the area and doesn't want to be marginalized; and a growing Hispanic community trying to find its way and stake its claim."

Former Dallas City councilwoman Sandra Crenshaw, who was among the African Leadership who supported the creating a district that would allow the 94% minority community to elect the person of their choice. Although, the current African American leadership did not field a black in District 5 out of deference to the redistricting process, two Pleasant Grove African American residents entered the race garnering 31% of the vote between the two.

Yolanda Faye Williams, an African America paralegal, financed her own unsuccessful bid. Williams bitterly accused the African American leadership and Bruce Shaw, a member of the prominent African American Gospel Tabernacle church in Pleasant Grove of entering the race to split the African American vote. Williams threw her support to the Anglo, citing that she feared that Diaz would turn Pleasant Grove into Little Mexico. Shaw did not endorse in the race citing that his supporters had endorsed candidates on both sides in the runoff. Shaw stated "while we must acknowledge that there will always be personal bias among, the voters, it behooves the leadership to be watchdogs to protect the integrity of the process."

Crenshaw painstakingly identified other African American neighborhood leaders who along with Bruce Shaw committed to meeting after the election to advocate for more voter education among both minorities.

Crenshaw contacted Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson during a radio appearance on the Rev. Marion Barnett talk show the morning of the election asking her to facilitate access to the Department of Justice Office of Civil Rights

•The Congresswoman responded "I would hope that your observances are just campaign tensions but my office has also received complaints from black senior citizens who feel uncomfortable about notices and verbal announcements written and spoken in Spanish that they don't understand." I will be glad to facilitate some discussions about race relations, the Congresswoman added. We have acknowledged the growing Latino population in our state. Many of them are not yet citizens but they, too must have a voice in our government. What we are experiencing is change and we just must work through change."
