#### Nelson Mandela Remains in Critical Condition

(AP) - A man who gave his life for humanity, all races, Nelson Mandela remains in critical condition.

President Jacob Zuma said on Monday, June 24, 2013, that Mr. Mandela remained in critical condition for a second day in a hospital in Pretoria where he is being treated for a lung infection.

"Doctors are doing everything possible to ensure his well-being and comfort," Mr. Zuma said at a news conference in Johannesburg, but he gave few details about the condition of Mr. Mandela, who was hospitalized on June 8, 2013.

Nelson Mandela is a South African politician who served as President of South Africa from 1994 to 1999. He was the first black South African to hold the office, and the first elected in a fully representative, multiracial election.

### Zimmerman Trial Begins

(AP) - Jurors in the Zimmerman trial heard opening statements from the prosecution and defense Monday, as lawyers outlined what they asserted happened on Feb. 26, 2012, when the defendant, George Zimmerman, allegedly shot the unarmed black teenager Trayvon Martin.

Zimmerman, a neighborhood watch captain for the gated community in Sanford, claimed self-defense on the charge of second-degree murder, and could face life in prison if convicted in the Florida courtroom.

Prosecutor John Guy began his argument with, "F---ing punks," citing the words Zimmerman used to characterize Martin in his call to police prior to the shooting.

Zimmerman "didn't see a young man walking home," Guy said. Instead, "he profiled him as someone who was about to commit a crime in his neighborhood, and then he acted on it, and that's why we're here."

The case has drawn national attention to Florida's controversial and heavily debated self-defense laws. There were numerous civil rights protests staged last year against what many saw as racial bias and unjust treatment of the case, especially when police did not arrest Zimmerman for 44 days after the incident.

## Zero Tolerance Discipline Policies: A Failing Idea

Added together, the tens of thousands of suspensions—many for minor infractions—have an enormous negative impact. As Wilka explains, "Children start down the path to prison in both jarring and subtle ways. It's not just the teenager who ends up behind bars; it's also the

child who is suspended for disruptive behavior, misses a few days of school, and begins to feel disconnected. The more disconnected he becomes, the more he acts out in class. This cycle repeats. National research suggests that this child is three times more likely to drop out of school by 10th grade than a student who has never been suspended; and dropping out triples the likelihood this child will end up incarcerated later in life. It is this indirect pipeline that can be addressed by implementing more nuanced approaches to school discipline, helping students stay in school—and out of prison."

All of this work has special implications in

Massachusetts because that state spends six times more per prisoner than per public school pupil—a greater disparity than in any other state. The most recent data show that in 2007 Massachusetts spent \$78,580 per prisoner and only \$12,857 per pupil. That's a pretty dumb investment policy. Sound fiscal policy means investing in early childhood development and education especially in these economic hard times. Intervening early not only saves lives and futures, it saves money. Zero tolerance discipline policies aren't helping the children who need intervention the most at all. Instead, they are excluding thousands of students from

school every year—including many students who most need to be in class—and making those children even more likely to end up trapped in the destructive, expensive prison pipeline. These kinds of policies deserve a failing grade and correction.

## "A PSALMIST'S PLEA FOR VINDICATION"

### PSALM 43:1-5

The word "vindicate" means to be clear from any suspicion, dishonor, or any charge of wrongdoing. Certainly, the psalmist is asking the Lord to defend him in the midst of his trouble. When we are in trouble, we need the Lord to vindicate our cause. The Lord is the only One who can aid us in the midst of our trouble for the Lord is a wonderful arbitrator. In Job 5:7, we are confronted with trouble as it states - "yet man

is born unto trouble, as the sparks fly upward."

Although faced with many problems, we need to rely on the Lord, for Job 9:33 says - "Neither is there any daysman (arbitrator) betwixt us, that might lay his hand upon us both." As our great "Arbitrator", we need to trust in Him and not to be discouraged. We should not get depressed and discouraged while facing problems in life, for Psalm 42:5 states - "Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted in me? hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise Him for the help of His countenance."

The psalmist begins this instructional psalm by praying that the Lord would vindicate him from his enemies who were evil

- "Judge me, O God, and plead my cause against an ungodly nation: O deliver me from the deceitful and unjust man" (vs. 1). Although praying confidently for the Lord's strength, David felt that the Lord had seemingly abandoned him in his flight (v. 2). As believers, we feel the same way as our problems mount; however, we need to be aware that the Lord is present always with us, for Hebrews 13:5b-6 states - "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee. So that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me."

In verse 3, the psalmist prays that the Lord would safely guide him to Jerusalem to worship; and being brought safely to

Jerusalem, he would vindicate his cause against his enemies. When the psalmist is delivered at Jerusalem, he will praise God - "Then will I go unto the altar of God, unto God my exceeding joy: yea, upon the harp will I praise thee, O God my God" (v. 4). When the Lord delivers us from any plight in life, we need to praise the Lord! The psalmist concludes this psalm on a note of praise for his distressed and disheartened soul as verse 5 states - "Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within me? hope in God: for I shall yet praise Him, who is the health of my countenance, and my God."

### Three injured at A&M released from hospital

Three men injured Saturday in the collapse of a barn frame under construction at Texas A&M University have been released from the hospital. St Joseph Regional Health Center officials said Sunday afternoon that a 35 year-old man remains in critical condition.

### 19 Year Old Fatally Shot outside Southwest Dallas Club

Dallas police are investigating the shooting death of a 19-year-old outside a crowded southwest Dallas nightclub early this morning. The shooting occurred just as Club Rio on South Walton Walker Boulevard was closing at 2 a.m. Tuesday. According to authorities, a fight broke out in the parking lot, and 19-year-old Jose Peralta was shot in the chest. He made it as far as a gas station next door, where a Dallas police officer tended to Peralta's wounds. The teen was transported to a nearby hospital, where he was pronounced dead. A gun was reportedly found

in the parking lot, but police don't yet have a suspect. The club was packed at closing time, and it's estimated there were hundreds of people heading for their cars at the time of the shooting. Many patrons have been taken to Dallas police headquarters for questioning. One woman told KXAS-Channel 5 that four men tried to get into her car shortly after the shooting.

19 Year Old Fatalmente tiro exterior Dallas club suroeste  
La policía de Dallas están investigando la muerte a tiros

de un joven de 19 años de edad, fuera de una concurrida discoteca suroeste de Dallas esta mañana.

El tiroteo se produjo como Club Rio en South Walton Walker bulevar se cerraba a las 2 am del martes. Según las autoridades, se desató una pelea en el estacionamiento, y 19 años de edad, José Peralta recibió un disparo en el pecho. Lo hizo hasta una estación de gasolina al lado, donde un oficial de policía de Dallas atendía las heridas de Peralta. El adolescente fue trasladado a un hospital cercano, donde fue declarado muerto.

Según informes, un arma fue encontrada en la playa de estacionamiento, pero la policía aún no tiene un sospechoso. El club estaba lleno a la hora de cierre, y se estima que había cientos de personas que se dirigían a sus coches en el momento de los disparos. Muchos clientes se han dado a la sede de la policía de Dallas para ser interrogado. Una mujer dijo a KXAS-Canal 5 que cuatro hombres trataron de entrar en su coche poco después del tiroteo.

## The Importance of Small Business

The expansion and creation of small businesses is extremely important to America's recovery from a period of intense economic instability. In Texas there are approximately two million small businesses. They are the largest employers in our state, representing more than forty-five percent of private sector jobs.

Many small businesses, owned by women and minorities, have grown during the last ten years, according to Texas economic officials who track business statistics. Minority owned businesses in the state number 725,000. Small businesses are defined as those who employ fewer than one hundred employees and whose annual revenues are less than \$20 million.

Small businesses owners in Texas, particularly in

North Texas, play a crucial role in strengthening our economy and creating vitally needed jobs. Women owned businesses, for instance, are helping to change the face of our nation's economic infrastructure.

Currently, women are the majority owners of a third of America's small businesses. They own half of all small businesses in this country, according to statistics keep by the Small Business Administration.

Most recently, I hosted, with the assistance of the Small Business Administration, the second of a series of forums dealing with small business issues, development and growth. The purpose of the forum, held on June 7th at the Bill J. Priest Center for Economic Development in South Dallas, was to promote efforts aimed at strengthening the role of women business owners in the community.

Specifically, the session which was attended by approximately fifty small business owners was designed to provide management and financial assistance that enhances women owned businesses.

Yolanda Olivarez, the U.S. Small Business

Administration's Regional Administrator, outlined for the attendees various programs that the SBA has in place to assist them. She also spent considerable time talking about three concerns that many small business owners have, capital, contracting and counseling.

In excess of \$75 million in SBA loans have been made to women owned businesses in the Dallas region since we have placed a major emphasis on the growth of small businesses owned by women, she said.

The SBA's office of Women Business Ownership advocates on behalf of businesses owned by females. There are approximately one hundred women's business centers located throughout the country which provide training, mentoring and counseling services to women business owners.

The next Small Business Forum will be held during the late summer. We will continue to match willing individuals with government officials, and private sectors participants who will provide a comprehensive view from a local, state and federal perspective of what it takes for business owners to become successful.

## Medgar Evers Would Be Proud

Fifty years after the NAACP field secretary was assassinated for his work to expand the vote, a new report reaffirms that his sacrifice was not in vain. For the first time in history, African Americans voted at a higher rate (66.2 percent) than non-Hispanic Whites (64.1 percent). According to the U.S. Census Bureau, black turnout increased by 1.7 million compared with four years earlier, and the Latino and Asian communities saw enormous increases as well.

This is exciting news. It puts to rest any notion that communities of color would fail to replicate their record turnout in 2008, which was hailed as the most racially and ethnically diverse electorate in history.

While we should enjoy this achievement, now is not the time to rest. As we realized after the disappointing showing in the 2010 midterms, black voter turnout is far from guaranteed. Instead, we should recognize that we succeed when we are invested with the spirit that Dr. King called "the fierce urgency of now."

As we look forward to 2014 and beyond, we need to consider what worked and how we can build on our momentum. The most important takeaway is that this was no accident. Some may argue that the surge in turnout was purely a fluke, fueled by excitement for a black candidate and pushback against voter suppression. Surely, both factors helped motivate people of color. But the historic numbers came from a much more organic and replicable reason: voter registration and Get Out the Vote efforts.

The 2010 midterm elections were a wake-up call. Over the next two years, the NAACP developed the largest voter registration campaign in our history. We deployed 2,300 volunteers across fifty states; trained 1,000 database experts in 600 communities; and complemented our boots on the ground with social media and a robust mail campaign.

By the night of November 6, our volunteers had registered 374,553 voters and mobilized 1.2 million people to turn out at the polls. In Florida alone, the NAACP and our partners registered over 100,000 voters - nearly twice as large as the margin of victory in that state's presidential race.

In the end, the NAACP was the most successful organization in the country for door-to-door voter registration, and third most successful overall, trailing the Voter Participation Network and Rock the Vote.

We set the bar high, and we must continue to exceed it - even when the presidency is not on the line.

In 2013, thousands of state and local elections will decide everything from county health commissioners to local boards of elections. Next year, a total of 36 governorships, 468 seats in Congress, and thousands of state legislators are up for election. The winners of these contests will make critical decisions about public education, criminal justice reform, voting laws and labor laws. They can either move our country forward or bring it backward.

In the months and years ahead, the NAACP will rekindle our campaign to make sure voters are registered, engaged and active in upcoming elections. We will continue to train our army of volunteers in methods old and new. You can be a catalyst for change by contacting your local NAACP unit and volunteering as a civic engagement activist.

As Medgar Evers said, "Our only hope is to control the vote." In 2012, we did just that, and we proved that organized people can beat organized money every time. If we continue to act with the "fierce urgency of now", we will continue to make history. If we become complacent, we risk letting our nation's ugly history repeat itself.

The last piece of confetti had landed, the Miami Heat championship celebration was officially over and many in the crowd of revelers were starting to make their way to the exits.

Players and coaches remained on the stage.

They were in no hurry to leave. Every member of the NBA champions stood and watched a giant video board play highlights of Miami's march through the playoffs, from LeBron James' MVP-caliber plays on both ends to Ray Allen's season-saving 3-pointer in Game 6 of the NBA Finals and countless moments in between.

"It's a special group," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said. "You know what? This season started over nine months ago with that trip to China and we were able to experience so many cool things together in the regular

season. But at times, it just seems to be going by so fast."

So maybe that's why the Heat aren't ready to stop celebrating this title just yet.

With an estimated 400,000 people lining the downtown Miami streets, the Heat held their parade and an in-arena rally afterward Monday. James stood atop a double-decker bus with a cigar in his mouth for the parade. Shane Battier blew kisses to the crowd, Dwyane Wade raised three fingers aloft and Chris Andersen flapped his arms in a nod to his "Birdman" moniker.

"It's the ultimate," James told Sun Sports, the Heat broadcast partner. "It's the ultimate. This is what I came down here, to be able to have a parade at the end of the year. I'm extremely blessed, man. It doesn't get any better than this."

Several players held super-soaker squirt guns and sprayed water on fans, confetti dotted the streets, and horns honked from all directions. Heat managing general partner Micky Arison and team president Pat Riley stood in the front of one bus, while Spoelstra -- his championship cap turned backward -- waved and clapped at fans.

"Miami parties better than any city in the world," Spoelstra said. "But it took nine months, nine months of incredible sacrifice, not only by these men right here but everybody in our organization, grinding it out every single day, ups and downs, highs and lows. And to have a culmination like Game 7 in front of all of you here is incredible."

Wade said that without the fans, Miami wouldn't have found a way to win the title.

## Contract Holds Up Doc Rivers Deal

(AP) AT PRESS TIME - The official completion of the deal that will send Doc Rivers to the Los Angeles Clippers is being delayed because Rivers and his representatives are still negotiating the language in the coach's new contract, league sources told ESPNBoston.com's Jackie MacMullan.

The NBA has not approved the deal yet, but the league also is not holding up the completion of the transaction, a league source told MacMullan. ESPN incorrectly reported earlier Monday that the league already had approved the deal.

Sources confirmed on Sunday that the Clippers will sign Rivers to the three-year, \$21 million contract. The Boston Celtics, who agreed to release Rivers from the remaining three years and \$21 million left on his current contract, will receive a 2015 first-round draft pick as

compensation in the deal.

League and team sources also confirmed that any deal presently involving Kevin Garnett and the Clippers is on hold in light of NBA commissioner David Stern's objections to the appearance that the trade was related to the deal involving Rivers.

One source with knowledge of the NBA's thinking told ESPN.com that the league does not intend to change its stance as expressed by Stern in multiple radio interviews Thursday, meaning that the league would view any subsequent trade agreement between the Celtics and Clippers involving Garnett to be part of the Rivers deal and thus in violation of league rules.

Celtics forward Jeff Green said Rivers called him on Monday to inform him of the coaching change. Although Green

acknowledged he was disappointed, he understands "this is a business."

"I can't speak for the other guys, but I'm not angry at all," Green told MacMullan. "I'm happy for him."

The Celtics reached the playoffs in each of the past six seasons under Rivers, winning five consecutive Atlantic Division titles from 2007-08 to 2011-12.

The Clippers' acquisition of Rivers apparently elevated Los Angeles' status as a preseason championship contender.

## Are You Raising One of the Next Generation of Hoodlums? PLANNING A CONSTRUCTIVE SUMMER

During the summer months, younger sons are usually occupied with activities planned by their babysitters and the child care workers at their daycare facilities. But for older sons, boys of 12 through 16 or 17, the start of summer means the countdown to September is on. As yet another school year has ended, parents begin making last-minute plans to keep their teen sons occupied for three long months. Sure, a few weeks may be spent on a family vacation, some teens may attend summer school, and others may take up a new hobby. But that still leaves hours each day and days each week when those teens are home with nothing to do. How many days can you invent amusing activities and outings that will keep your teen out of trouble?

With less structure and adult supervision, the summer is ripe with opportunities for teens to fall into a bad crowd, experiment with drugs or alcohol, or get into other forms of mischief. If your teen has been struggling during the school year, more trouble may be awaiting you in summer. There's a reason for the saying, "Idle hands are the devil's tools." Teen boys are looking for adventure, risk, and excitement, especially in the summer. Being bored at home is the exact opposite of what they need. They will find a way to take risks and live adventurously with or without your support and guidance. So please be proactive and provide it!

According to a poll by nonprofit organization *Fight Crime: Invest in Kids California*, boys who are not supervised are more likely to commit crimes, be victims of crimes, do drugs, or hang out with gang members. The organization also reports that youths start committing crimes around noon during the

summer, compared to 3 p.m. during the school year. In addition, teen boys tend to commit drug crimes later in the evening during the summer, most likely because they can stay out later without worrying about getting an early bus for school. This means that your teen son needs constructive activities to occupy a broader range of time in summer than during the school year. For most working parents, it's difficult (if not impossible) to be around from noon until late in the evening every day.

A report from the *White House Office of National Drug Control Policy* suggests that more American teens try marijuana for the first time in summer than at any other time of year. This translates into 6,300 new users each day, a 40 percent increase in first-time youth marijuana use during June and July as compared to the rest of the year. A hike in new underage drinkers and cigarette smokers also occurs during the summer months.

By taking proper precautions and planning ahead, parents can make summer vacation a positive and memorable growth experience for teens. One constructive activity to keep teens busy this summer is a part-time job. Many parents find internships or small tasks for their children to do at their place of employment, or you can help your teen apply to local grocery stores, restaurants, retail stores, local car washes, or pet care facilities. Teens can also earn extra money babysitting, doing yard work, house-sitting, and other odd jobs. Part-time work helps teens budget, make friends, comply with authority, develop a strong work ethic, and learn the value of a dollar. The important thing to keep in mind is that your son needs to be constructively occupied during summer months, and that there are numerous ways to accomplish this and that his parents should play a major role in making this happen.

Teens squeal with delight at the thought of no school and no responsibilities. It is an excellent time for your son to rest and recover from the regimented school schedule. However, parents need to guard against boredom.
