SELMA, Ala. (AP) — Charles Mauldin was near the front of a line of voting rights marchers walking in pairs across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma,

DEBT RELIEF JUST GOT REAL: EXPERIAN ERASES MILLIONS IN BALANCES FOR AFRICAN AMERICANS

Experian has launched a major debt relief initiative, committing \$5 million to assist 5,000 families in Louisiana and aiming to expand to other locations. The effort, carried out in partnership with public benefit corporation ForgiveCo, seeks to ease the financial burdens of households grappling with credit card and personal loan debt.

Steve Hartmann, vice president of Integrated Marketing at Experian, said in an interview with Black Press USA that the initiative goes beyond advertising and directly helps consumers. "Consumer debt is at an alltime high—credit card balances are soaring, and minimum payments are shrinking. We wanted to do more than just advertise our products. We needed to actively engage with the community and provide real financial relief," Hartmann said.

ForgiveCo plays a crucial role in the initiative by identifying and purchasing debt in collections on behalf of Experian. "We wanted to focus on credit card and personal loan debt, specifically targeting families in Louisiana who need it the most. ForgiveCo identifies these accounts in collections, purchases the debt on our behalf, and then we notify beneficiaries through direct mail, text, and email," Hartmann added.

Recipients will not owe taxes on the forgiven debt, an important aspect of the initiative. "They do not have to pay taxes on this," Hartmann confirmed.

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A 40-day Target boycott began last week

What to know about the protest and its potential impact

NEW YORK (AP) — A 40-day boycott of Target that calls for supporters to give up shopping at the company's stores during the Lenten period kicked off this week, to protest the discount retailer's decision to end some of its diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives.

The Rev. Jamal Bryant, senior pastor of New Birth Missionary Baptist Church near Atlanta, organized the "Target Fast" that began Wednesday — the first day of Lent — along with other faith and civil rights leaders. A website for participants points to the spending power of Black Americans and described the boycott as "a spiritual act of resistance."

"This is a fast for accountability. A fast for justice. A fast for a future where corporations do not bow to pressure at the expense of marginalized communities," reads a message on targetfast.org. "Turn your dollars into data, power, and change."

Target declined to comment directly on the boycott, which runs through April 17. Here's what to know.

What happened with Target's DEI initiatives?

Target announced in January that it would phase out a handful of DEI initiatives, including a program designed to help Black employees build meaningful careers and promote Black-owned businesses.

The Minneapolis-based company, which operates nearly 2,000 stores nationwide and employs more than 400,000 people, said it long had intended to end the program this year, but its announcement came after other prominent American corporations scaled back their diversity activities.


Target also said it would stop setting hiring and promotion goals for women, members of racial minority groups and other underrepresented communities.

Conservative activists, and more recently, President Donald Trump's White House, have sought to rid the federal government, schools and private workplaces of DEI policies that were adopted to counter discrimination. Critics maintain the range of goals and programs arising from such policies are themselves discriminatory and counterproductive.

While Target rival Walmart also rolled back its DEI initiatives in November, Target's actions seemed to cause more customer outrage. Numerous calls for boycotts emerged across the country, including from Minneapolis civil rights activists who gathered outside Target's headquarters. The daughters of one of Target's co-founders also expressed shock and

troopers, deputies, and men on horseback. They kept going. After they approached, law enforcement gave a two-minute warning ministration's effort to remake federal agencies they said helped make America a democracy for all

Speaking at the pulpit of the city's historic Tabernacle Baptist Church, House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries said what happened in Selma changed the nation. He said the 60th anniversary comes at a time when there is "trouble all around" and some "want to whitewash our history." But he said like the marchers of Bloody Sunday, they must keep going. "At this moment, faced with trouble on every side, we've got to press on," Jeffries said to the crowd that included the Rev. Jesse Jackson, multiple members of Congress and others gathered for the commemoration. Members of Congress joined with Bloody Sunday marchers to lead a march of several thousand people across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. They stopped to pray at the site where marchers were beaten in 1965.

Terri Sewell of Alabama.

Sewell, a Selma native, noted the number of voting restrictions introduced since the U.S. Supreme Court effectively abolished a key part of the Voting Rights Act that required jurisdictions with a history of racial discrimination to clear new voting laws with the Justice Department. Other speakers noted the Trump administration's push to end diversity, equity and inclusion efforts and a rollback of equal opportunity executive orders that have been on the books since the 1960s. In 1965, the Bloody Sunday marchers led by John Lewis and Hosea Williams walked in pairs across the Selma bridge headed toward Montgomery. "We had steeled our nerves to a point where we were so determined that we were willing to confront. It was past being courageous. We were determined, and we were indignant," Mauldin recalled.

Kirk Carrington was just 13 on Bloody Sunday and was chased through the city by a man on a horse wielding a stick. "When we started marching, we did not know the impact we would have in America," he said. Dr. Verdell Lett Dawson, who grew up in Selma, remembers a time when she was expected to lower her gaze if she passed a white person on the street to avoid making eye contact. Dawson and Mauldin said they are concerned about the potential dismantling of the Department of Education and other changes to federal agencies. Support from the federal government "is how Black Americans have been able to get justice, to get some semblance of equality, because left to states' rights, it is going to be the white majority that's going to rule," Dawson said. "That that's a tragedy of 60 years later: what we are looking at now is a return to the 1950s," Dawson said.

"The surprise element is what attracted customer ire" said Akshay Rao, a marketing professor at the University of Minnesota's Carlson School of Management. He and others point to Target's previous messaging around DEI and reputation as a strong advocate for the rights of racial minorities and LGBTQ+ people. on Wednesday that about 110,000 people signed up to participate. Bryant was not immediately available for further comment when The Associated Press contacted his staff

to disperse and then unleashed violence.

"Within about a minute or a half, they took their billy clubs, holding it on both ends, began to push us back to back us in, and then they began to beat men, women and children, and tear gas men, women and children, and cattle prod men, women and children viciously," said Mauldin, who was 17 at the time.

Selma on Sunday marked the 60th anniversary of the clash that became known as Bloody Sunday. The attack shocked the nation and galvanized support for the U.S. Voting Rights Act of 1965. The annual commemoration pays homage to those who fought to secure voting rights for Black Americans and brought calls to recommit to the fight for equality.

For those gathered in Selma, the celebration comes amid concerns about new voting restrictions and the Trump ad-

"We gather here on the 60th anniversary of Bloody Sunday when our country is in chaos," said U.S. Rep.

He said the "country was not a democracy for Black folks" until voting rights. "And we're still constantly fighting to



Target also faced boycott calls almost 15 years ago after it was revealed that the company donated to an organization that supported Republican Tom Emmer, then a vocal opponent of gay marriage, in his campaign to become Minnesota's governor. Then, as now, Tarreceived more get blowback than other companies that made similar donations because its actions ran counter to expectations, Rao said.

What does giving up Target for 40 days involve?

Organizers of the "Target Fast" urged people who take part to stop shopping at Target and instead redirect their dollars to Black-owned businesses.

Targetfast.org lists the demands of boycotters, which include Target completely restoring its commitments to DEI and honoring a previous pledge to spend over \$2 billion with Black-owned businesses by the end of 2025.

Bryant, the pastor spearheading the protest, told The Washington Post on Thursday.

The Rev. Al Sharpton, founder and president of the National Action Network, announced in late January that the civil rights organization would identify two companies in the next 90 days that will be subjected to consumer boycotts for abandoning their DEI pledges.

What impact will the 'Target Fast' have?

Time will tell. But experts say boycott appeals reflect the risk companies face when making moves that could potentially alienate their customer base — particularly when the moves go against past corporate messaging.

"One of the ways that you can really upset (consumers) is to claim to be something and then violate that standard that you claim to be," Americus Reed II, a marketing professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business, said. "It lands really poisonous on people, especially in vulnerable communities where people have put their trust in you. ... And now, you're reversing."

A sense of betrayal can be a significant motivator for customers to take their money elsewhere, Reed said. And successful boycotts, he adds, need to generate enough energy to "make this not just a moment, but a movement."

The Superior Priesthood of Christ

The grand theme of the great book of Hebrews is the Superiority of Jesus Christ. The author, who is unknown, has presented a powerful argument that Jesus Christ is superior to anything that Judaism has to offer. In fact, in his cogent argument, he presented the fact that the Christian faith and life as being superior (better than) to Judaism or any other religious system. In a convincing way, the writer is urging his Jewish audience to remain steadfast to their Christian profession and not to abandon Christ because of persecution and troubles they were experiencing. In renouncing the person and work of Jesus Christ, they (his Jewish audience) would be exchanging reality for rituals, substance for symbols!

In his superb argument, the writer demonstrated that Jesus Christ is superior to the Prophets (Hebrews 1:1-3) because the Prophets' revelation was partial and fragmentary; whereas; the finality of God's revelation found its completion in Jesus Christ. In Hebrews 1:4-2:18, the author demonstrated that Christ was superior to Angels because Angels were mere messengers of God, but Jesus Christ is the Son of God who will inherit the Messianic Kingdom! In Hebrews 3:1-6, the writer demonstrated that Jesus Christ is superior to Moses, for Moses was a servant in the house; whereas, Christ is the Son over the house! To this point, the author has unfolded several warning passages, and they consist of: the danger of drifting (Hebrews 2:1-4), the danger of hardening the heart (Hebrews 3:7-4:13), and the danger of falling away (Hebrews 5:11-6:20). In an effort to present the superior greatness of Christ's Priesthood to the Aaronic Priesthood, let us observe: "The Deficiency of the Levitical Priesthood" and "The Declaration of a

Hebrews 7:11-22

Superior Priest in Christ."


I. The Deficiency of the Levitical Priesthood – Hebrews 7:11-14

Having established the superiority of Melchizedek's greatness over the Aaronic Priesthood, the author unfolds the fact that the Law and the Levitical system were inadequate in addressing the critical need of mankind; therefore, the old Levitical system had to be changed by a better system.

In proving the point of the old Levitical system did not address the critical need of mankind, in verse 11, the author declared that a change was needed because the Law and the Levitical Priesthood could not grant the people perfection (absolute and complete) communion with God. The author proves that the Levitical Priesthood was imperfect, pointing to a new priest arising from an order other than Aaron's. The thing that characterized the Aaronic Priesthood is that it never gave redemption and acceptance before God to the people. In addition to the Levitical Priesthood being inadequate, the Mosaic Law had to come to an end also if a change was necessary from the Levitical order to the Melchizedecan order (v. 12).

In verses 13-14, the author declared that the Levitical Priesthood was superseded by the fact that our Lord came from the tribe of Judah, and not from the tribe of Levi! Our Lord could not serve as priest after the order of Aaron, but after a new order - the Melchizedecan order. Therefore, the priesthood had to be changed since Christ did not come from Levi. Having discussed "The Deficiency of the Levitical Priesthood," let us now observe "The Declaration of a Superior Priesthood in Christ."

II. The Declaration of a Superior Priesthood in



Christ – Hebrews 7:15-22

In verses 15-17, the author stresses the superiority of Christ's Priesthood by quoting from Psalm 110:4, a psalm that emphasizes Christ's endless life: "Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek." In viewing verses 18-19, the author presented a stark contrast between Christ's priesthood and the inherent weakness of the Aaronic Priesthood. The Aaronic Priesthood that was weak and unprofitable was replaced with the Priesthood of Christ. Lastly, in verses 20-22, no Old Testament priest was inducted into office with an oath; however, Christ was inducted into office by a singular oath, for God Himself has sworn that Christ's Priesthood will last forever. The Lord has become "a surety of a better testament" (v. 22). He is personally pledged to see that His Priesthood works.

It is indeed comforting to know as believers, that



we have a Great High Priest who lives perpetually (forever) and that He is accessible. As we sojourn in this ungodly world, we are comforted in knowing that our High Priest is in glory praying for us, and He has promised to never leave us alone, for Hebrews 13:5 says: "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee."

We need not fear what man might try to do unto us, because we have an eternal helper in Jesus Christ, for verse 6 of Hebrews 13 says: "So that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me."

As also confirmed by the hymn-writer:

O God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home.



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
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

Finally, one day ended with a man offering ven-


triloquist lessons. "How do I know they work?" I asked.

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Chiefs agree to 2-year, **\$20 million deal with veteran** cornerback Kristian Fulton, **AP** source says

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Kansas City Chiefs have agreed to a two-year, \$20 million contract with former Titans and Chargers cornerback Kristian Fulton, a person familiar with the negotiations told The Associated Press on Tuesday.

The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the deal had not been announced.

The Chiefs entered free agency in search of a veteran cornerback to solidify a defensive backfield that struggled when it lost cornerback Jaylen Watson to an injury last season. Fulton is big and physical

enough to play on the outside, and his versatility would help to free up Trent McDuffie, their All-Pro cornerback and best player in pass coverage.

Fulton helped LSU win the national title before he was picked by Tennessee in the second round of the 2020 draft. He played four seasons for the Titans before spending last season in Los Angeles, where he had 51 tackles and an interception.

That pick was a memorable one for the Chiefs, coincidentally. Fulton was returning it when Patrick Mahomes tried to make a tackle near the sideline,

and his helmet hit the knee of Kansas City wide receiver Rashee Rice, who had also been chasing down the play. Rice wound up needing season-ending surgery to repair the damage to the knee.

The deal with Fulton one day before the start of the new league year came after Kansas City agreed to a two-year, \$30 million contract with offensive tackle Jaylon Moore and a one-year, \$3.5 million pact with running back Elijah Mitchell on Monday.

It has already been a busy offseason for the Chiefs after their blowout loss to Philadelphia in the

Super Bowl.

Last week, the Chiefs traded All-Pro guard Thuney to the Bears for a fourth-round pick in the 2026 draft, which freed up some much-needed salary cap space. They used some of it on a three-year, \$45 million deal to keep linebacker Nick Bolton and an \$11 million contract for wide receiver Marquise Brown, who missed most of last year with a shoulder injury.

The Chiefs also put the franchise tag on right guard Trey Smith, which would amount to a \$23.4 million deal for next season.

As the Trump administration moves to dismantle the Education Department, officials have suggested other agencies could take over its major responsibilities: civil rights enforcement to the Justice Department, perhaps; student loans to Treasury or Commerce; oversight of student disability rights to Health and Human Services.

Less clear is what could happen with a more lofty part of its mission — promoting equal access for students in an American education system that is fundamentally unequal.

The department has cut its workforce in half, including a layoff of 1,300 people announced Tuesday. President Donald Trump pledged dur-

helmets and protective gear when riding bicycles, scooters or any motorized vehicle such as an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) can help prevent brain injury and even death. Staying hydrated is important, particularly if you're spending time in the sun. Overheating or dehydration can quickly lead to serious conditions like heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

If your family will be visiting somewhere with a focus on water-related activities, either swimming, boating or simply enjoying the view, always practice water safety.

"For families with young children, it's very important to supervise them at all times near water, even if everyone knows how to swim," said Courtney Edwards, DNP, MPH, RN, CCRN, CEN, TCRN, NEA-BC, Director of Trauma Community Outreach at Parkland Memorial Hospital's Rees-Jones Trauma Center. "If you plan to be on a boat, ensure everyone is wearing life jackets. Even experienced swimmers need to be mindful of their limits and pay attention to water conditions, such as waves or strong currents."

If a road trip is part of your plans, always make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly buckled up and that children are in the appropriate car seats for their age and size. According to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), during the 2023 spring break period 375 alcoholrelated crashes in Texas occurred, resulting in the deaths of nine drivers. If you plan to consume alcohol, know your options in advance and decide whether you'll take public transportation, use a ridesharing service or carpool with a sober driver.

For families traveling internationally with young children or older adults, it's also important to be aware of the ongoing measles situation in Texas and across the country. Measles is a highly contagious viral illness that can have serious complications, especially for vulnerable populations.

"The best way to protect children from measles is to make sure they get all the recommended vaccines at the required ages for school attendance," said Donna Persaud, MD, MBA, Parkland's Homeless Outreach Medical Services (HOMES) Medical Director and a board-certified pediatrician. "Adults are considered immune if you were born before 1957, had laboratory confirmed measles at some point in life, or have documentation of receiving a two-dose measles vaccine for school entry. If you are unsure, check with your doctor for guidance as you can either be tested for immunity or receive the vaccine."

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

THE TRUTH CLINIC Let Us Rise Up and Build (Neh. 2-18) Part 3

The fourth thing Nehemiah did was request specific help to begin this process:

"O Lord, let your ear be attentive to the prayer of this, your servant, and to the prayer of your servants who delight in revering your name. Give your servant success today by granting him favor in the presence of this man." (Nehemiah 1:10-11a NIV) What man? He goes on to tell us:

> Nehemiah Speaks to the King

Nehemiah got the news in December, but it was not until four months later that an opportunity presented itself for Nehemiah to act:

In response to the King asking, What do you want?.. Nehemiah answered, "If it pleases the king and if your servant has found favor in his sight, let him send me to the city in Judah where my fathers are buried so that I can rebuild it."

Observe how tactful is

Nehemiah's presentation. Twice he refers to Jerusalem, not as the capital of Judah, or even by its name, for it had a reputation as a troublesome city and had been the source of revolt in the empire before, but he designates it as "the city where my fathers are buried."

That is an accommodation to the King's own concerns. These ancient kings were greatly concerned about their burial. This king would be immediately sympathetic to Nehemiah's desire to go and restore the city where his fathers were buried. Nehemiah wisely plays upon that interest and presents his case in the best possible light.

This suggests to us that if we are truly concerned about rebuilding parts of our life, we need to think seriously about what it will require. We must assess what we will actually need, what steps we should take, and what may be involved in changing our habits so that we can be freed to be what God wants us to be. Nehemiah teaches us that we need to face the reality of our situation, no matter how bad it might be.

> Nehemiah Travels to Jerusalem

Nehemiah also beseeched the king, "If it pleases the king, may I have letters to the governors of Trans-Euphrates, so that they will provide me safe-conduct until I arrive in Judah? And may I have a letter to Asaph, keeper of the king's forest, so he will give me timber to make beams for the gates of the citadel by the temple and for the city wall and for the residence I will occupy?" And because the gracious hand of my God was upon me, the king granted my requests. The king also provided army officers and cavalry to travel with me.

Notice that at this point, Nehemiah did not send messengers all over the empire announcing that he was on his way to rebuild Jerusalem. Nor did he convene any town hall meetings to proclaim how the King had so honored him with safe passage letters and other kingly authorizations. His total game plan was not publicly acclaimed (self-aggrandizement), so his enemies could not undermine the plan even before it started.

With the king's permission, Nehemiah and his entourage embark on the arduous 1,000 mile journey to Jerusalem.

Inspection of Wall

After arrival in Jerusalem, Nehemiah takes three days to recover from the journey, and then he begins to personally examine every aspect of the devastating conditions that exist in Jerusalem. . He viewed the decay, the ashes, the holes in the walls, the burned gates, and the places most vulnerable to attack.

Trump imposes sweeping 25% steel and aluminum tariffs. Canada and Europe swiftly retaliate

(CNN) President Donald Trump imposed sweeping 25% tariffs on all steel and aluminum imported into the United States Wednesday, a policy aimed at leveling the playing field for US manufacturing but a move that threatens to drive up prices on a broad range of consumer and industrial goods for Americans.

It's the latest salvo in Trump's multifaceted tariff plan aimed at correcting perceived trade imbalances and reigniting domestic industry. But it risks igniting a global trade war. The European Union, hit for the first time by higher US tariffs since Trump returned to the White House, retaliated within hours with countermeasures on US goods exports. And later Wednesday, Canada announced over \$20 billion in retaliatory measures as well.

Trump on Wednesday in the Oval Office said the United States would up the ante after the European and Canadian retaliation, but he did not spell out how or when the United States would respond.

"Of course I will respond, Trump said.

The tariffs on steel and aluminum mark the first time in Trump's second

term that a set of tariffs has been applied to all countries.

Imposing steel and aluminum tariffs poses a risky bet: Although it could give America's steel and aluminum industries a boost, it will raise prices on a key ingredient for American manufacturers, which could be passed on to consumers. The costs could outweigh the benefit.

Canada retaliates

Before Wednesday, Trump had only enacted tariffs that applied to China, Mexico and Canada this term. In the case of Mexico and Canada, businesses can avoid paying tariffs through April 2 if they comply with the USMCA.

Canada announced a series of retaliatory measures on Wednesday morning that are set to take effect on Thursday, which includes 25% tariffs on \$29.8 CAD billion (\$20.1 billion) imports of US goods such as steel and aluminum products.

Canada also targeted billions of dollars worth of imports from the US of computers, sporting equipment and cast iron products.

WHY ARE YOU STILL SUPPORTING THEM?

A growing number of prominent US companies have announced they have scaled back or eliminated Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) initiatives.

Their retreat from DEI began after a June 2023 U.S. Supreme Court ruling against affirmative action in college admissions and accelerated after President Donald Trump's executive orders against all federal diversity initiatives.

Now longstanding programs to improve the hiring and promotion of African Americans and other minority workers in corporate America are now under serious threat.

The attack on diversity has been swift.

After taking office on Jan. 20, President Trump issued a series of executive orders aimed at dismantling Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) programs across the federal government and the private sector.

The attack on diversity is bad for a multi-ethnic country and bad for business which needs a diverse workforce.

DEI programs seek to ensure fairer representation for groups historically marginalized such as African Americans, women, LGBTQ+ community members, and disabled people.

Diversity helps businesses by boosting innovation, expanding talent pools, and enhancing brand reputation, ultimately leading to improved financial performance and a more competitive edge. A diverse workforce opens up opportunities to access a wider range of talent and skills, allowing businesses to tap into a broader pool of potential employees with unique experiences and expertise.

A diverse workforce can better understand and meet the needs of a diverse customer base. This allows businesses to tailor their products, services, and marketing strategies to resonate with a wider range of consumers.

However, if companies retreat from committing to the principles and practice of diversity in a multi-ethnic America, why should they be supported? The Philadelphia Tribune's response to the Trump administration's attacks on diversity and democracy begins with reporting the truth and holding those in power accountable.

More specifically, we ask you to strongly consider whether you should continue to spend your dollars with companies who have publicly announced their decision to retreat from diversity. Here's a look at some companies that have retreated from DEI:

Amazon

Amazon said it was halting some of its DEI programs, although it did not specify which ones. In a Dec. 16 memo to employees, Candi Castleberry, a senior human resources executive, said the company has been "winding down outdated programs and materials, and we're aiming to complete that by the end of 2024."

Target

The retailer said in January that it was ending a program it established to help Black employees build meaningful careers, improve the experience of Black shoppers and to promote Black-owned businesses.

Target, which operates nearly 2,000 stores nationwide and employs more than 400,000 people, said it also would bring to an end its diversity, equity and inclusion, or DEI, goals it previously set in three-year cycles

The goals included hiring and promoting more women and members of racial minority groups, and recruiting more diverse suppliers, including businesses owned by people of color, women, LGBTQ+ people, veterans and people with disabilities.

Meta

Meta Platforms inc the parent company of Facebook and Instagram said it was getting rid of its diversity, equity and inclusion program, which featured policies for hiring, training and choosing vendors.

McDonald's

Four years after launching a push for more diversity in its ranks. McDonald's said that it is ending some of its diversity practices, citing the U.S. Supreme Court decision that outlawed affirmative action in college admissions. McDonald's said on Jan. 6 that it will retire specific goals for achieving diversity at senior its suppliers to develop diversity training and to increase the number of minority group members represented within their own leadership ranks.

Walmart

The world's largest retailer confirmed in November that it would not be renewing a five-year commitment for an equity racial center set up in 2020 after the police killing of George Floyd.

Ford

CEO Jim Farley sent a memo to the automaker's employees in August outlining changes to the company's DEI policies.

Lowe's

In August, Lowe's executive leadership said the company began "reviewing" its programs following the Supreme Court's affirmative action ruling and decided to combine its employee resource groups into one umbrella organization. Previously, the company had "individual groups representing diverse sections of our associate population"

John Deere

The farm equipment maker said in July that it will no longer sponsor "social or cultural awareness" events, and that it would audit all training materials "to ensure the absence of socially-motivated messages" in compliance with federal and local laws,

Tractor Supply

The retailer in June said it was ending an array of corporate diversity. Tractor Supply said it would be eliminating all of its DEI roles while retiring current DEI goals.

Unfortunately the list of companies retreating from diversity is growing. We will post this list in print, online and on social media when available. If new companies announce their withdrawal from diversity we will add them to the list of companies whose practices we are now calling into question.

We must speak out and send a loud and clear message to corporate America that a retreat from diversity means a withdrawal of our support and practices will be documented and provided to our readership. WHEN: Friday, March 14, 2025 | 11 AM - 1 PM

Michelle Obama and her brother to launch a podcast with weekly guests

NEW YORK (AP) — Michelle Obama and her brother, Craig Robinson, will host a new weekly podcast series starting this month featuring a special guest pulled from the world of entertainment, sports, health and business.

"IMO with Michelle Obama & Craig Robinson" will address "everyday questions shaping our lives, relationships and the world around us," according to a press release. IMO is slang for "in my opinion."

Some of the guests slated to speak to the former first lady and Robinson, the executive director of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, include the actors Issa Rae and Keke Palmer and psychologist Dr. Orna Guralnik.

Other guests include filmmakers Seth and Lauren Rogan; soccer star Abby Wambach; authors Jay Shetty, Glennon Doyle and Logan Ury; editor Elaine Welteroth; radio personality Angie Martinez; media mogul Tyler Perry; actor Tracee Ellis Ross; husband-and-wife athlete and actor Dwyane Wade and Gabrielle Union; and Airbnb CEO Brian Chesky.

The first two episodes — the first is an introductory one and the second features Rae — will premiere on March 12. New episodes will be released weekly and will be available on all audio platforms and YouTube.

"With everything going on in the world, we're all looking for answers and people to turn to," Obama said in a statement. "There is no single way to deal with the challenges we may be facing — whether it's family, faith, or our personal relationships — but taking the time to open up and talk about these issues can provide hope."

Obama has had two other podcasts — "The Michelle Obama Podcast" in 2020 and another in 2023, "The Light We Carry." Her husband, Barack Obama, offered a series of conversations about American life between him and Bruce Springsteen.

The new podcast is a production of Higher Ground, the media company founded in 2018 by the former president and first lady.
