

Texas appeals court blocks inmate Rodney Reed's execution

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas' top criminal appeals court on Friday halted the scheduled execution of inmate Rodney Reed, whose conviction is being questioned by new evidence that his supporters say raises serious doubt about his guilt.

The stay of execution by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals came just hours after the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles had recommended delaying the lethal injection.

The 51-year-old Reed had been set for lethal injection Wednesday evening for the 1996 killing of 19-year-old Stacey Stites. Prosecutors say Reed raped and strangled Stites as she made her way to work at a supermarket in Bastrop, a rural community about 30 miles (50 kilometers) southeast of Austin.

Reed's efforts to stop his execution have received support from such celebrities as Beyoncé, Kim Kardashian and Oprah Winfrey. Lawmakers from both parties, including Texas GOP Sen. Ted Cruz, have also asked that officials take a closer look at the evidence in the case.



The film starred Terrence Howard, Larenz Tate, and Chris Tucker as returning Vietnam War veterans whose lives after discharge were plagued by crime, addiction, and a host of psychological challenges.

"As Black veterans, we not only face post-traumatic stress syndrome (PTSD), but we have racially induced PTSD as well because there's so much racism in the military," Merretazon said.

He believes race has played a significant role in his battle with Philadelphia

Department of Veterans Affairs have conducted various studies of PTSD in ethminority Vietnam nic Veterans. The results of the research are not entirely consistent. Still, VA officials noted that the overall finding seems to be that most ethnic minority veteran groups have a higher rate of PTSD than White veterans.

According to the VA, some of this may be due to conflicts psychological related to identification with the Vietnamese. Another factor may be higher exposure to war zone stressors, VA officials stated.

Merretazon said his court battle had progressed well. An appeals panel earlier indicated that the only thing keeping him from prevailing was that he lived outside of the city.

"I live in a neighboring county, but I do my work in the city of Philadelphia," Merretazon stated. "But, it's clear that Philadelphia is trying to cover up their misdeeds toward veterans. The fact that there's no office of veterans affairs is wrong.

Merretazon has obtained full benefits, but, he must continue to fight for others.

"The veterans who come home to Philly have nobody saying what to do, and through our ministry, we've been able to provide direction on direct services," Merretazon said. "It's wellknown that many are hurting. There are significant guaranteed benefits for the veterans and their families, but they aren't getting them. "I'm 100 percent disabled. I've got mine. I'm trying to help other people get what they deserve."

Feds want redesign of part on Boeing 737s after Southwest engine blowout

Federal safety officials say Boeing should redesign part of the casing on some engines to prevent the kind of accident that occurred when engine debris blew out a window on a Southwest Airlines plane and killed a passenger.

The National Transportation Safety Board determined Tuesday that the April 2018 accident was caused by a cracked fan blade that broke off in flight, hitting the engine case at a critical location. Parts of the engine turned into shrapnel, striking the fuselage. After a harrowing emergency descent from 32,000

the plane, the pilots of Southwest flight 1380 were able to land the crippled Boeing 737 in Philadelphia.

Safety board Chairman Robert Sumwalt said engine and aircraft manufacturers should develop stronger designs for engine casing to prevent broken fan blades from ever causing such catastrophic damage again.

"That translates to a better chance that damage to the aircraft will be minimized during a (broken fan blade) event, improving the safety of the flying public," Sumwalt said.

The events of flight 1380 led to more frequent and intenfeet (9,750 meters), with one sive inspections of fan blades

passenger blown partly out of on certain engines made by CFM International, a joint venture between General Electric Co. and France's Safran SA. Those checks at Southwest and other airlines turned up about 15 other fan blades with slowly spreading cracks from fatigue or wear during normal use.

> A Southwest 737 suffered a similar engine break-up in 2016, but pilots landed safely in Pensacola, Florida. NTSB investigator Pierre Scarfo said the board found no evidence to believe that the fan blade problem was unique to maintenance or operations at Southwest, which has the world's largest 737 fleet. However, earlier this year the

Transportation Department's inspector general cited the Philadelphia incident among the reasons that it was reviewing government oversight of the airline.

On Tuesday, the NTSB recommended that the Federal Administration Aviation require Boeing to determine the most vulnerable locations on the engine fan case on certain planes if a fan blade breaks loose, and to redesign the cowling for better structural integrity. The board also recommended that airlines be required to retrofit many older Boeing 737s with the redesigned engine-housing part.

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

Texas appeals court blocks inmate Rodney Reed's execution

Parkland diabetes patient counts her blessings and her carbs

In its four-page order, the appeals court said Reed's case should be returned to the trial court in Bastrop County so it could examine his claims that he is innocent and that prosecutors suppressed evidence and presented false testimony.

Bryce Benjet, an attorney with the Innocence Project, which is representing Reed, said defense attorneys were "extremely relieved and thankful" to the appeals court.

"This opportunity will allow for proper consideration of the powerful and mounting new evidence of Mr. Reed's innocence," Benjet said in a statement.

The Texas Attorney General's Office declined to comment Friday on whether it would appeal the order staying Reed's execution.

Earlier Friday, the parole board had unanimously recommended a 120-day reprieve for Reed. The board rejected Reed's request to commute his sentence to life in prison.

The parole board's decision was to go next to Gov. Greg Abbott, who hasn't said whether he would accept or reject it or do nothing. Abbott's decision moot. Since taking office in 2015, Abbott has halted only one imminent execution, in 2018.

Since Texas resumed executions in 1982, only three death row inmates have had their sentences commuted to life in prison by a governor within days of their scheduled executions.

Reed has other appeals pending, including with the U.S. Supreme Court. His supporters have held rallies, including an overnight vigil on Thursday in front of the Supreme Court in Washington, D.C. It was unclear if a rally planned for Sunday in front of the Texas governor's mansion would still take place.

Reed has long maintained he didn't kill Stites and that her fiance, former police officer Jimmy Fennell, was the real killer. Reed says Fennell was angry because Stites, who was white, was having an affair with Reed, who is black.

Fennell's attorney has said his client didn't kill Stites. Fennell was paroled last year after serving time in prison for sexual assault.

In their most recent motion to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, Reed's lawyers alleged prosecu-

> Prosecutors say Reed's semen was found in the victim, his claims of an affair with Stites were not proven at trial, Fennell was cleared as a suspect and Reed had a history of committing other sexual assaults.

> Reed's lawyers say his conviction was based on flawed evidence. They have denied the other sexual assault accusations made by prosecutors.

> Reed's attorneys filed a federal lawsuit in August to compel DNA testing of crime scene evidence, including the believed murder weapon. His lawyers say the testing, which has been fought for years by prosecutors, could identify someone else as the murderer. The lawsuit is still pending.

In recent weeks, Reed's attorneys have presented affidavits in support of his claims of innocence, including one by a former inmate who claims Fennell bragged about killing Stites and referred to Reed by a racial slur. Reed's lawyers say other recent affidavits corroborate the relationship between Stites and Reed and show Fennell was violent and aggressive toward her.

Former 'sweets junkie' shares tips for a healthier Thanksgiving

DALLAS – "My family always said, 'Stop eating like that,'" Tonami Jones, 57, recalled. But it wasn't until she became seriously ill in April 2019 that the self-confessed 'sweets junkie' took their advice seriously.

"All of a sudden I got dizzy and my sister called the ambulance and I was taken to Parkland Hospital," Jones said. "They told me my blood sugar had spiked and I had type 2 diabetes."

Two days later the Dallas resident was discharged from the hospital with diabetes medications, information about enrolling in a diabetes education class and a new attitude about her health.

"I do want to live," she said frankly, "and I knew if I didn't do some things to make my health better, I wouldn't be around much longer."

Jones has a strong family history of diabetes. Her grandparents, sisters and brother all were diagnosed with type 2 diabetes, but instead of heeding their warnings, for most of her life Jones had given in to her lifelong craving for cake, candy, sodas and other sweets.

The diabetes education class she attends at Parkland Health & Hospital System's Bluitt-Flowers Health Center opened her eyes to a whole new way of eating, Jones said. "I always ate poorly but now I know how important vegetables are for good health. I hardly ever ate them before but now I love them!"

Once a week Jones visits the DeSoto farmer's market and shops for fresh cabbage, peas, tomatoes, cucumbers and other greens. She has learned to cut back on breads, starches and meat, putting extra helpings of veggies on her plate instead, and watch por-

tion size. Since her diabetes diagnosis, Jones has also started walking daily and has dropped nearly 20 pounds as well as lowering her A1c (blood sugar) level from 11.2% to 5.9%.

"Now that I'm feeling better, I try to walk 15 to 20 minutes a day and next thing on my agenda is to increase my walking and lose more weight."

With Thanksgiving approaching, Jones and her sister, who also has type 2 diabetes, are planning a traditional family meal that is diabetes-friendly. "Lots of green vegetables, turkey, ham, maybe a small serving of dressing or macaroni and cheese. I'll allow myself a little bit of dessert, but I'm not going to overdo it - instead of a big slice of cake, I'll just have a nibble. I don't want to go backwards," she said.

Parkland registered dietitian Sharon Cox, who leads the diabetes nutrition class that Jones attends, said that family Thanksgiving meals for those with diabetes can still be delicious, but it does take some planning. "You don't have to deprive yourself but you do need to be aware of your carbs and watch your blood sugar," she said.

Whether you have diabetes or are hosting friends or families with the disease, Cox offers these tips for a healthy Thanksgiving all can enjoy:

Start the day off with breakfast; avoid skipping a meal to save up for the holiday dinner.

Drink more water to stay hydrated. Avoid sugary drinks. Snack on raw vegetables with hummus or low-fat dip before the meal instead of high-fat, high-calorie appetizers.

Look at all the food on the

table before you start filling your plate.

Fill half your plate with green leafy vegetables, Brussels sprouts, broccoli or green beans. Start with the vegetables to help curb your appetite.

Avoid vegetables in creams, gravies and butter to avoid fat calories.

Choose the white meat over dark meat to consume less fat.

Make fat-free gravy; skim the fat off the top after the broth has cooled to reduce fat, but keep the flavor.

If you are planning to have dessert, skip the dinner rolls, cornbread and other starchy foods to control carbohydrate intake.

Make cranberry sauce with fresh cranberries to avoid the added sugar in canned sauce.


Limit alcohol to avoid drops in blood sugar levels and weight gain. Eat before drinking alcohol.

Eat slowly, talk to family and friends between bites of food, put the fork down, and take time to enjoy the meal and company.

This Thanksgiving, Jones said she will be counting calories and carbs, but most of all her blessings. "I'm grateful I have learned how to take better care of myself and have a chance to lead a healthier life," she said.

White teen girl aimed to attack black Georgia church

ATLANTA (AP) — A white 16-year-old girl is accused of plotting to attack a mostly black church in a north Georgia city, where police say she planned to kill worshippers because of their race.

African Bethel Methodist Episcopal Church has a predominantly black congregation, Gainesville Police Chief Jay Parrish said in a statement Tuesday.

"Our investigation indicated the church was targeted by the juvenile based on the racial demographic of the church members," he said.

Students, school administrators and law officers worked together to thwart a "potentially horrific incident," he added.

Police did not release her name.

The plot came to light when Gainesville High School students told administrators the 16year-old had a notebook with detailed plans to kill worshippers at the church, Parrish said.

"It just grieves my spirit on a number of different levels, one that the intentions of this young person were so calculated to do great harm against people who just simply had no knowledge of such a plot," said the Rev. Rose Johnson Mackey, director of the Newtown Florist Club, a civil rights organifounded zation in

Gainesville 70 years ago.

The girl is charged with criminal attempt to commit murder, the police chief said. She's being held in a youth detention center in Gainesville.

Details of the alleged plot haven't been released, but Parrish said it came to light Friday when school administrators contacted police.

Gainesville is about 50 miles (80 kilometers) northeast of Atlanta. It's a city of just over 40,000 people, about 17% of Africanwhom are American.

Police: Woman critically injured in mauling by pit bull dogs

DALLAS (AP) - Police say a 76-year-old woman has been hospitalized in critical condition after she was mauled by three pit bull dogs.

The dogs' owner was later arrested and charged with serious bodily injury by dog attack, a felony punishable by two to 10 years in prison.

A police statement says the incident was reported shortly before 11:30 a.m. Friday near Beckley Heights Park in far south Dallas. Officers arrived to find the woman wounded and witnesses who directed them to where the dogs had gone.

The statement says the dogs appeared to have dug under their fence and escaped their yard before the attack.

Dallas Animal Control have taken the dogs into custody.

Former Fort Worth Police Chief **Joel Fitzgerald** testifies to get his job back

DALLAS – The former Fort Worth Police Chief Joel Fitzgerald testified on Tuesday in a lawsuit to determine why he should get his job back.

Fitzgerald was terminated from his job as the chief of the Fort Worth department six months ago due to; he believes he tried to expose corruption at city hall. But some members of the Police Worth Fort Department claim they had lost confidence in his leadership.

Fitzgerald also spoke in detail about the investigation he says doomed his career. He said he found a breach in the sys-

tem after looking into city employees with criminal histories but were still allowed access to sensitive federal data through the Criminal Justice Information System.

The hearing Fitzgerald testified at is to determine if a restraining order remains in place blocking the city from naming a permanent police chief.

Fitzgerald also testified that for over a year, the department falsely claimed the problem was remediated. He said when it was clear there was a deception; he wrote a 10-page memo to the city manager stating his intent to turn over his findings to the feds. But just before a scheduled meeting with the FBI, he was fired.

One relatively unsung product of its liberal sway is the founder of the annu-AfroComicCon, al Oakland's Michael James. Now in its third iteration, AfroComicCon is a threeday event showcasing comic books and pop culassuredly not limited to) the African Diaspora.

The event is held in the cities of Oakland and neighboring Emeryville, California and aims to be an inclusive entity as opposed to other, similar conventions geared towards special groups and demographics. It is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization affiliated with the Oakland Technology and Education Center.

Comic book conventions showcase comic books and related areas of entertainment, and feature exhibits, panels, and features of interest.

Initially, low-brow affairs concentrating solely on comics and special interest groups (the first San Diego Comic-Con was held in a

haps 300 people in 1970), these "cons" have mushroomed to multi-genre affairs drawing tens of thousands of participants and showcasing gaming, sci-fi, horror, and other facets of pop culture.

Film and television companies use these venues to showcase their wares and gauge public response to shows prior to general release.

Monetarily, they are a financial windfall, generating millions in revenue and contributing significantly to the surrounding community's economy. A major component of these events is the practice of cosplay, in which fans dress up as their favorite superheroes and animated characters.

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Federal Court Blocks Trump Asylum Ban from Being Applied to Thousands of Asylum Seekers
