DALLAS ISD SCHOOL BOARD KEEPS SUPERINTENDENT MIKE MILES



DISD Superintendent Mike Miles will keep his job, but he will be placed on a 90 day "growth plan." Monday night the DISD school board voted 5-3 to allow him to stay in his current role.

The vote was in response to the recent independent investigation which determined Mr. Miles violated district policy when he attempted to interfere with another investigation and his assistance with drafting of a letter criticizing the school board.

The majority of the trustees did not feel like his actions warranted termination.

The board issued a letter of reprimand.

California Bridge named for Texan Willie L. Brown, Jr.

The Willie L. Brown, Jr. Bridge was approved by the California State Legislature. The resolution, ACR 65, was approved by the State Senate on a 26 to 7 vote.

Willie L. Brown, Jr. was elected to represent San Francisco as a Member of the California State Assembly from 1965 to 1995. During his tenure, Brown held a number of high ranking leadership positions and was elected as Speaker of California State Assembly from 1980 to 1995. Brown was the longest serving Speaker and the first African American Speaker in California history.

After completing his service in the State Assembly, Brown was elected to serve as the 41st Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco from 1996 to 2004. As Mayor, he restructured the city's transit system, expanded affordable housing programs, created a model juvenile justice system and spearheaded the expansion of the University of California, San Francisco campus.

The California NAACP will lead a private fundraising effort to pay for signs to be erected at the entrances of the Willie L. Brown, Jr. Bridge. That effort and the erection of the signs are scheduled to be completed in 2014.

ALL DISTRICT STUDENTS CAN EAT BREAKFAST AND LUNCH FOR FREE

Every student in Dallas ISD can now eat free breakfast and lunch at no cost to them. Effective today, Oct. 1, Dallas ISD is implementing Provision 2, a federal amendment that allows the National Lunch and School Breakfast programs to be offered districtwide to all students free of charge.

The Dallas ISD Food and Child Nutrition Services Department announced the new initiative which will make it possible for every student to receive nutritious meals every school day.

"This is an incredible opportunity for the students of Dallas ISD," said Dora Rivas, executive director, Food and Child Nutrition Services. "We know that students who have nutritious meals each day perform better in school. It is impossible for students to do their best work if they are hungry. Through this provision everyone wins, especially our students."

The district qualifies for this option based on the number of completed applications for free and reduced-priced meals received by FCNS. While the district received 85 percent of the needed number of completed applications for a successful roll-out, FCNS continues to encourage parents who have not completed an application to do so in order to maximize the success of the Provision 2 amendment. Meal applications will be accepted throughout the year, and families can support this initiative by submitting a meal application by the end of October. Applications can be completed on-line at foodapps.dallasisd.org.

The reports have become widely respected throughout the industry and have created more conscious consumers. OVERVIEW

Black buying power continues to increase, rising from its current \$1 trillion level to a forecasted \$1.3 trillion by 2017.¹ African-Americans have unique preferences from the total U.S. population that makes them an important group to watch. Of the \$75 billion spent on television, radio, internet, and magazine advertising only \$2.24 billion was spent with media focused on Black audiences. Black businesses, agencies, and media continue to wrestle with this disparity as it is not reflective of the overall high consumption patterns and behavioral trends of the Black consumer.



DEMOGRAPHICS

43 MILLION BLACKS LIVE IN THE U.S.

53% OF BLACK POPULATION IS UNDER THE AGE OF 35

The Black population, on average, is three years younger than their peers, with an average age of 35 compared to 38. More than half of the population, 53%, is under the age of 35, compared to 47% of the Total Market population.

54% OF ADULT BLACK POPULATION IS FEMALE

Black women continue to grow their importance to the Black community. Black women Head of Households represent 29% of all Black households, compared to 20% for the overall population.² Women control 43% of the annual spending power for the Black population, and own the majority of Black businesses.



WHERE BLACKS SHOP

On average, Black households shop more frequently (8 trips more) than Total Market households and are more likely to frequent dollar stores (7 trips more), convenience stores (2 trips more) and drug stores (1 trip more), but spend an average of \$8 less per trip.

Retail channels where Blacks make fewer trips are grocery stores (3 less), warehouse clubs (3 less) and mass merchandisers (2 less). This could be a direct result of the "retail deserts" phenomenon which suggests some urban and rural communities are lacking in the number and size of certain retail outlets, especially large chains, compared to other communities, which leads to a further issue of "food deserts". Annual commitments from mass merchandisers like Walmart, Walgreens, and CVS to carry more fresh produce will help to alleviate this problem.⁴

Blacks consistently place a higher emphasis on grooming and beauty categories and at the top of that list is Ethnic Hair and Beauty Aids (HABA) which Blacks purchase nine times more than others.

BRAND LOYALTY

Blacks spend 18% of their annual retail dollars on store brands, or private label items. Out of the top 20 store brand product categories purchased by Blacks and White Non-Hispanics there are six categories unique to African-Americans:

Blacks watch 37% more television than any other group, spending seven hours and 17 minutes per day viewing TV, compared to five hours and 18 minutes of total viewing for Total Market. Black Women, especially those 18-49, tend to be heavier viewers than their male counterparts.

"A PSALM DECLARING GOD'S ULTIMATE RULE" PSALM 47:1-9

Psalm 47 is a psalm of triumph that pays homage to our great King, the Lord Jesus Christ. This psalm has been labeled as an enthronement psalm that anticipates Christ's ultimate reign during the Millennium (Revelation 19:15). Psalm 47 opens with the psalmist's call for all nations to pay owing respect to Israel's King, the Lord Jesus Christ. The psalmist exclaims in verses

1-2, "O clap your hands, all ye people; shout unto God with the voice of triumph. For the LORD most high is terrible; He is a great King over all the earth."

Such acclamation of praise is due to our Lord, the King, because He is great and He is worthy to be praised. The United States Senate finEach day approximately 1.5 million Americans engage in a battle with their own bodies due to Lupus. Often times this internal conflict is unknown to their families and friends. Even though the disease can strike men and women of all ages, 90 percent of its victims are female. What is even more alarming is that it affects minority women two to three times as much as white women.

A recent survey revealed that nearly three-fourths of all Americans between the ages of 18 and 34 have never heard of

this disease, and ironically those who fall in that age bracket are at the highest risk. We must build awareness about this chronic condition and simultaneously work to increase funding for research to improve the diagnosis of this disease that disproportionately affects minorities and women in the prime of their lives.

The disease is Lupus-- an unpredictable and misunderstood disease in which the immune system is out of balance, causing damage to any organ system in the body. Lupus can affect any or all organs in the body including the skin, lungs, heart, joints, kidneys, and brain. Common symptoms include joint pain, skin rashes, overwhelming fatigue and fevers that last for days or weeks.

Currently, there is no procedure that determines whether

or not a patient has lupus, and the disease often imitates other illnesses making it challenging to diagnose. On average, it takes a person with lupus three to four years and three doctors to receive an accurate diagnosis. Researchers have yet to discover the cause of Lupus and while it does appear in certain families, no gene or gene group has been proven to cause this debilitating disease.

Treatment for lupus can be very expensive because of its multi-faceted nature. Annually, lupus costs our nation about \$31.4 billion. The annual cost for treatment for an individual with lupus is an estimated \$20,000. The cost to treat an individual with lupus nephritis, kidney inflammation caused by lupus, could be as high as \$62,000 per year.

Ultimately, extensive research is needed to better understand this disease and to

discover effective treatments. But without sufficient funding, research into the cause of lupus and the discovery of new treatments will be delayed. Currently, there is only one FDA approved drug to treat Lupus, but due to the vastness of the disease one drug cannot treat every case. I am astutely aware of our current economic conditions, but we cannot afford to make drastic cuts to funding for agencies like the National Institutes of Health that conduct valuable research leading to cures for diseases like Lupus.

I have recently joined the Congressional Lupus Caucus, established so that members of Congress can help increase awareness of Lupus and advance vital research. It is my hope that my colleagues and I can work together to find solutions to help facilitate scientific efforts to find a cure for this debilitating disease.







History of the Montford Point Marines

In 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt established a presidential directive giving African Americans an opportunity to be recruited into the Marine Corps. These African Americans, coming from all states, were not sent to the traditional boot camps of Parris Island, South Carolina and San Diego, California. Instead, African American Marine recruits were segregated and assigned to basic training at Montford Point, a newly established facility at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. Conditions were less than hospitable. Prefabricated huts used as barracks were often filled beyond capacity. Those buildings and others—leftovers from an earlier Civilian Conservation Corps unit—were dilapidated. Undeterred by such living conditions, the overt racism and segregation of the era, and surrounded by an air of constant doubt about their capabilities, the men that would become known as the Montford Point Marines persevered.

Before closing its gates in 1949, approximately 20,000 African American recruits received training at Montford Point Camp. These Marines served honorably in the Saipan, Guam, Tinian, Peleliu, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa campaigns during World War II and beyond. The initial intent of the Marine Corps' leadership was to discharge these African American Marines after the war, returning them to civilian life, and leaving the Marine Corps an all-white service. Once given the chance to prove themselves, it became impossible to deny the fact that this new breed of Marine was just as capable as all other Marines regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin. These Marines' honorable, courageous, and committed service in defense of freedom serve as a gleaming testament to their undaunted character and sacrifice—endeavors that led our nation to victory and forever pulled down racial barriers that existed within its military.

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
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
